

## KEARN'S CROWD JUST SIMPLY QUIT

The Antis Had a Walkover at the  
Republican Primaries Last  
Night.

## CASE OF FOX AND THE GRAPES.

Senior Senator's Field Staff Concluded  
That They Didn't Want Any  
Delegates Anyhow.

The Kearns crowd just quit. It became apparent several days ago to the senior senator's field staff that it would take some "putty" to carry the primaries that were held last night and thereby have a look-in on the selection of delegates to the national convention. The same was more painfully apparent yesterday and for a few hours the marshals struggled like the proverbial Trojans, against terrific odds, to swing the districts into line. But they soon realized the hopelessness of the effort. The anti-Kearns people had built up a veritable Fort Arthur of defenses and quietly the word was passed around that "Senator Kearns decided not to mix in this fight. It is petty," or words to that effect. And the delegates elected in Salt Lake last night who are known to be favorable to Kearns may be counted on the fingers of two hands.

It seems certain at this time that the delegation to the Republican national convention will comprise six of the following: George Sutherland, James H. Jackson, Salt Lake; C. E. Loose, Provo; W. F. 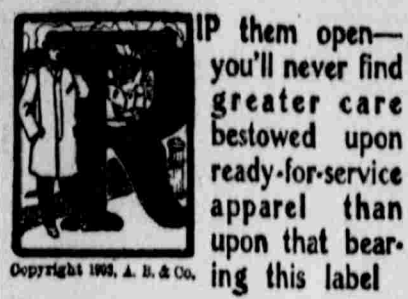

## DIVORCE MILL.

### Some Salt Lake Statistics That Furnish Food for Thought.

Seventy-seven cases filed in the district court of this county is the record established during the month of March. During the same month last year 71 cases were filed and during the month of February this year 69 cases were filed. Of the total number filed the past month 24 were divorce cases and 21 of the total number were impecunious cases.

The records of the county clerk's office show that there were 34 marriage licenses issued during March. The ratio of marriages to divorces in the county is 1 to 2.5.

## A NEW SUBSTANCE.

From Vienna come news of a radioactive substance of increased intensity, which Prof. Markwald has recently isolated from Joachimsthal pitchblende, and to which he has given the name of radio-actinium. This body possesses intense radio-activity, and especially great power in ionizing the air in its immediate vicinity, and in discharging Leyden jars without sparking. These effects were obtained from a few hundredths of a milligram of the new substance which in its most active form is not self-luminous. It is obtained with quite as much trouble as radium, and Prof. Markwald was forced

to work over two tons of pitchblende in order to obtain less than four milligrams of the active matter. The active matter is obtained finally, deposited on a plate of bismuth or copper, which has been immersed in the solution, for several days. While this deposit is composed almost entirely of ordinary tellurium, nevertheless it carries down with it the minute quantity of the substance to which is due the radio-activity and which can be separated by precipitating the tellurium. The new substance possesses certain properties in common with polonium, and Madame Curie, the discoverer of the latter, has protested against a new name being given to it.

Chief of these points of agreement, is the fact that it emits only the A-rays which do not penetrate, but it differs from polonium in that its activity does not diminish to about one-half in the course of a year, but remains constant—Harper's Weekly.
