He regards the retire-ment as voluntary, as the votes last night, although showing small majori-tiles, gave enough margin to permit of carrying on the ministerial program; but he considers that his departure will facilitate the realization of the pro-

but he considers that his departure of facilitate the realization of the pro-gram instead of interrupting it, since his successor will be able to unite the discordant elements which have bee personally hostile to him. is conceded that this voluntary withdrawal will permit Premier Combes to exercise a powerful and probably a decisive influence in the choice of his successor similar to that which M. Waldeck-Rosseau exercised when voluntarily relinquishing power. If M. Combes exercises the authority to name his own successor, he may designate M. Brisson, who as president of the chamber of deputies, assisted in the ex-M.

continuer of the Combes program. The names of M. Millerand, Pioneere, Du-mour and Clemenceau also are promi-nently mentioned, their strength de-pending upon later combinations in the majority groups. The new ministry will have the same

The change will insure the abondonment of the last vestige of this system. The enactment of an income tax and other important meas-ures will not be materially affected. Washington, Jan. 15,-William Wil-iams, commissioner of immigration at lew York, has tendered and the pres ident has accepted his resignation, to take effect Feb. 10. In his letter, dated Jan. 12, accepting the resignation, the president says:

Most reluctantly I have come to the onclusion that I shall have to accept your resignation. In accepting it le me repeat in writing what I said to you by word of mouth in endeavoring to get you not to insist upon it. I fee that you have rendered a service of real and high importance to the whole na-tion in your management of the office under you. When I asked you to take the position I realized that I was asking you to do what meant genuine self-sacrifice on your part and I realize that your consenting to stay in so long has meant further loss to you. But surely you must feel recompensed by the knowledge of the value of your work. You have set a standard of unceasing industry, of uniting energy, of high administrative ability and of singlehis term in prison. minded devotion to duty which you successor will find it difficult to equal

Disapproves President's Plan.

Disapproves President's Plan. Boston, Jan. 15.-In an address before the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, division 61, on the occasion of its fortleth anniversary today. President Lucius Tut-lie of the Boston & Maine railr of spoke of President Roosevelt's proposal that railroad rates be regulated under congressional supervision and authority. Mr. Tuttle declared that such a policy. If earried out, must inevitably affect the income of the L000.000 persons who gain their livelihood directly from the rail-roads. He did not think it had been or constitution ever had any other thought in mind in connection with the delegation to Congress of the power to regulate in-terstate commerce relations than a well defined intent to forever prevent the erec-tion, by any state of any customs, tariffs or other harriers that should be an ob-struction to the free currents of com-merce.

PANAMA MATTERS.

Objection to, Am. Minister and Canal Gov. Being Same Person.

Panama, Jan. 15 .- Representatives of all political parties here have asked American Minister Barrett to withdraw the sugestion he made to the Washing-ton government that the functions of government of the canal zone and min-ister to Panama be combined in the person of the governor of the canal zone. It is argued by the memorialists that the dignity of Panama as an independent nation requires a separate le

The minister has replied that the sug gestion was made in the interests of both Panama and the United tSates and that he cannot withdraw it. He said that he would report the request to his government without prejudice to the attitude of Panama.
