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

THE AMADOR BANDITTI. MURDER AND ROBBERIES BY A GANG OF SLAVONIANS.

But meager details of the murder and robberies by a band of four Slavonian desperadoes, led by one Andrew B. Jo vichevich, in Amador and other letire from business. countles, have been published in the telegraphic news. Captain Lees has received information that the leader is pearly run to earth by the officers who have been in pursuit of him, and late last night imparted the appended details of the murder and robberies of the desperadoes.

It is said that a large raward will soon be offered by the governor. The "General" speaks but little English, and that little very brokenly. A HUGE MAN-EATER.

CAPTURE OF AN ENORMOUS SHARK IN SAN FRANCISCO BAY.

Fishing has not been very good around Angel Island of late, and aside from the general bad luck there have been numerous losses of tackle. Several hundred feet of "set" lines have been lost during the past few weeks. One of these, the property of a Chinese fisherman, had over 200 hooks at-Henry Sagotti, Frank Lavo, Giovan-ni Vicenti and Giovanni Valle have

The shark is a man-eater and the largest ever captured in the bay, and possibly the largest ever caught on this coast. He has not yet been weighed, but it was estimated by several fisher-men yesterday afternoon that he would tip the scales at from 1,500 to 2,000

pounds. The queer part of this true fish story has yet to be told. - From the mouth of the man-eater dangles two worn and knotted pieces of half-inch rope, from the appearance of which it is evident that he had been caught before and has made his escape by breaking the ropes. A hole was made in the side of the shark, and the fact was revealed that he had swallowed an indigestible mass of fishing lines and a large number of hooks. The lines are evidently at tached to the ropes, and they are no doubt the property of the Chinaman who claims to have recently lost a quantity of such tackle. - S. F. Chronic'e, Sept. 11.
