# CAMPED ON THE BORDERS.

CAMPED ON THE BORDERS. On the evening of Oct. 23, thousands of men left Thorne, Yerington, Haw-thorne, Mason and other points out-side the reservation lines and camped on the borders, ready for the rush, which was announced would be signal-ed by a mighty blast of glant powder from the top of Mt. Grant, the highest peak on the western range of the re-servation. Over 2,000 men camped on Cat creek near Hawthorne the night before the opening but before the sun appeared on the morning of Oct. 29, hundreds of these men had eluded the vigilance of the Indian guards and made their way into the interior. The more honest of the treasure seekers remained on the line, however, and when the report of the explosive rang through the canyons of the Walk-

rang through the canyons of the Walk-er range and across the waters of the broad lake, there was a general stam-

Men were on foot, in automobiles mounted on race horses, ponies and burros and all rushed along the lake shore for one objective point, Dutch-man creek, where the famous old Ar-astra mine is located.

MILLER LEAD THEM ALL.

MILLER LEAD THEM ALL. August Miller, a merchant of Haw-thorne, was the first to reach the de-sired point and immediately located six claims, one of them showing a large ledge of gold bearing ore, and report-ed to be the richest on the east side of the west range. Others in the party traveled as fast as they could and many gave out and made their way to the mountain side, disappointed and weary, unable to go further and watching with regret the great race before them. While this rush from Cat creek was

While this rush from Cat creek was in progress, men were also rushing from the north and from Squirrel Springs, and other points on the west-ern boundary line nearest to Yerington. others were also launching rowboats, gasoline launches and saliboats or a fast trip across the lake to the moun-tains, on the west side which stood like giants before them. Some of these boats succeeded in making fast time boats succeeded in making fast time across the smooth waters, but others failed, and one boat, the "Speghetti," belonging to San Francisco parties still remains stranded in the middle of the lake.
