

WHY NOLAN DON'T WANT JEFFRIES.

Said He Thought There Might be Collision Between Jeff And Jim.

BUT FIGHT WILL TAKE PLACE.

Both Nelson and Britt Say They are Not Worried Over Question Of Referee.

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—The managers of Britt and Nelson, after their late session last night, at which they failed to reach an agreement regarding a referee, arose late today and have not as yet held their promised conference. They will meet, however, at a later hour and endeavor to come to an understanding. It is not anticipated that this unexpected hitch will cause a permanent deadlock in the fight preliminaries, though it is impossible to predict what settlement of the difficulty will be made, as Britt insists on Jeffries and Nelson's manager strenuously objects to the choice of the retired champion.

Both the contestants are continuing their training, and the demand for seats is as brisk as ever. "There will be a fight," said Nelson at his training quarters today. "Don't worry about that. I will fight Britt at Colma Saturday. But you can say that what my manager, Nolan, has done here is to give me approval. If he has objected to Jeffries he has good reason. I will take any man for a referee, barring Billy Roche. He can't act, but any of the others will do. This is my position in the matter."

Jimmy Britt appeared to be not the slightest disturbed by the referee matter. He said today:

"I am not bothering myself a particle about the referee. That is out of my hands entirely. I am out here training to fight and I will be ready to enter the ring Saturday. Mr. Jeffries will referee the fight and there will be no purse slip. Jeffries is suitable to me, and he was to stand up to now. One thing about Jeffries, he has the confidence of the public, and that is worth something."

The referee has been chosen and the fight will take place at 1:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

It has never been objected to Jeffries on the score of his position, but on account of the change in the betting I thought that there might be collision between Jeffries and the Brits."

Such was the statement made tonight by Billy Nolan, manager of Fighting N. J. Nolan, who prefaced this remark with the statement that he was firm in his refusal to allow Nelson to go in the ring Saturday if the heavyweight champion is to be the referee, and added that Nolan will abide by any decision that his manager may make. Nolan declared that Nelson never made the statement attributed to him today that any referee, except Billy Roche would be agreeable to him.

Nolan said: "I was perfectly satisfied to have Jeffries act as referee after the role had been tossed between him and George Siler, but changed my mind when Jeffries was decided."

What San Francisco Officials Say About Coming Fight.

Talk about "Native Son" sentiment in the big fight next Saturday night, and the following, clipped from the San Francisco Bulletin:

"Chief of Police Jeremiah F. Dinan: I think so much of Jimmy Britt that I believe with the weight of a sack of shot in his chest he could hit Jim Jeffries, I would have to fight with him in his native land with the sturdy Dan."

Sergeant Frank Norman, Clerk of the Court of Records, has to say that both boys will be there at the fight and the referee who regards his future will call the million a dime.

Danny Long, for instance, had with a hood in a pinch. Nothing to it but Britt from the first to the last.

Captain of Police M. O. Anderson: Somewhere along after the twentieth round you will see the local boy draw away from the battle, and from that time on it will only be a question how the finishing punch will be put over."

Pat Gray, Chief of Department 1 of the Police Court—Jimmy Britt is the candy for me. He has Nelson lashed in cleverness, stamina and the all directions around—somebody kindly tell me how he can lose."

Sergeant of Police Charles McDonald: I might might have the money in an early round, but Britt will outgame him if the fight goes on long. He has a better chance than the Hagschick had, and that counts a head over a long journey."

Police Judge Conlon—Britt all the way. Police Judge Pitt—It will be a battle in which only one man will make a showing. That man will be our Jimmy. He cannot lose."

Barney Flood—It's Britt. He will win with a knockout this time for sure. Aving Captain of Police Harold Resmold—I cannot see how anybody can figure Nelson. Britt is the card; Britt will be the favorite in the betting and Britt will win."

Police Judge Morgan—In any kind of a battle Nelson may choose to start he will find him in the time. I look for Britt to carry the milling to him and win as he pleases."

Jack Rogers, once pugilist, now policeman—It is a pipe for our Jimmy. The master of the kid from south of the slot has not yet been announced."

Jack Rice, Clerk of Department 2 of the Police Court—I am blind if anybody makes me to look at any man in this contest but Jimmy Britt. It will only be a question of time as to when he wants to slow the husky kid from Hegewich away."
