

INDIANAPOLIS, 15.—W. B. F. Treat was nominated for Congress to-day at Martinsville, by the Fifth District Republican Convention.

COLUMBUS, Ga., 15.—The democrats of the Third District of Alabama nominated Col. W. C. Oates for Congress.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., 15.—The democratic conferences of the Nineteenth Congressional district have unanimously renominated F. E. Bettzthoover.

NEW YORK, 16.—The *Commercial Bulletin* says: The steamship *Cyphrene*, now at Montreal, was one of the successful pioneer mail steamers on the Pacific. At one time she ran in the monthly mail line between Sydney, N. S. W. and San Francisco. She then entered the China trade, and on her last voyage her gross freight on tea from Hong Kong to New York, was over \$70,000. She was then chartered by Hart Brothers & Co., of Montreal, to bring a cargo of 1,700 tons of Welsh coal. She has had her saloon passenger accommodations taken away and is fitted up for carrying cattle instead, which pays much better than carrying passengers. Among her crew are some 20 veritable pig-tails, shipped at Singapore; perhaps the largest number of celestials ever seen in Montreal.

Christine Cox, the convicted murderer of Mrs. Hull, was hanged this morning in the jail yard of the Tombs, in the presence of about 200 persons. At 8.37 the neck of Cox was attached to a guillotine and he was at once jerked into the air. After hanging 16 minutes, Cox was pronounced dead.

Two brutal prize fights occurred here yesterday. One was conducted in Central Park, and after a few rounds, the principals and seven spectators were surrounded and captured by the police. About a thousand spectators escaped. Neither principal was seriously hurt. The other fight was conducted to the finish, on a wharf between piles of lumber. Several rounds were fought when one principal was knocked insensible, and afterwards taken to the hospital. No arrests in this case.

The heat continues oppressive. Seventy-two children under five died here yesterday.

CHICAGO, 16.—The *Times'* Washington special says: Don Cameron and family, in robust health, left this evening for Pennsylvania. He had a long interview with Marshall Jewell. The recent visit of Simon Cameron to his son was to induce him to choke down his pride and go to work, in order to hold his position in Pennsylvania. Garfield has promised the Camerons all they can desire, and they accept and will labor earnestly for the ticket.

The *Times* has a special detailing exciting events in Carroll County, Arkansas, by which a thievish tramp and two citizens lost their lives. J. W. Myers, a farmer living in that county, found, upon returning to his house from the fields, that it had been plundered in his absence. He immediately gave chase and ran the thief down in Scott County, Missouri, where he was stopping over night at the house of Mr. Kimberling. He soon had him covered with a rifle, and the tramp smilingly said he would surrender, but five seconds later drew a pistol, while his captor was off his guard, and shot him through the heart. The tramp then escaped back into Arkansas, where the sheriff and eight men finally ran him down at the house of an old man supposed to be his father. They surrounded the house and when he appeared in the door opened fire on him simultaneously, causing the dust to fly from his clothes, but not fatally wounding him. He returned the fire with a pistol in either hand, and while the others were reloading took to the fields. The posse followed and fired another volley and brought him to the ground, apparently dead, but when one of the party, a Mr. Jones, went up to take a look at "the most daring man that ever lived," the fellow pointed a pistol directly at his head and fired it, Mr. Jones fell back dead. The desperado, desperately wounded in several places, soon after expired. He is believed to have been concerned in many dark deeds of late in this section.

BRADFORD, Pa., 16.—Solid shot were fired into the second burning tank at Custer City at one o'clock this morning to draw off the oil, and thereby prevent an overflow. However, the work was commenced too late, and afterwards the oil boiled over furiously, and set fire to the side tank, and it is now a seething sea of fire. There are three other tanks in the immediate vicinity.

Another thunderstorm passed

over the city this morning. Considerable damage was done by lightning, which near the centre of the city struck and burned two oil tanks. One of 1,200 and one of 600 barrels were struck and are now burning. Great excitement prevails. The people are out in force fighting fires. The damage will be very great.

WASHINGTON, 16.—The report of General Dunn, Judge Advocate-General of the army, upon the Whittaker case, was received by the Secretary of War this morning. The document reviews critically the evidence and findings of the West Point court of inquiry. Nearly an hour was occupied in the reading. The Secretary will not pass upon it for some days and declines to make public its recommendation.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 12.

A movement is on foot in the House of Commons to present an address to Premier Gladstone, assuring him of the willingness of a large number of the members to support him in continuing the session as long as he may deem it necessary to carry out the government programme.

A Geneva dispatch reports great alarm in Western Switzerland, owing to the appearance of phylloxera in several parts of the Canton of Vaud.

There are sensational and improbable rumors that the Czar contemplates abdication.

Orders have been received at Nicolaiff to prepare as soon as possible four of the best torpedo boats belonging to the Black Sea fleet, to be sent to the Pacific. Several vessels have been chartered in foreign ports for transport service. The ironclad, *Peter the Great*, is left a rival for the sea. The cruiser *Europe* sailed from Cronstadt.

An Odessa dispatch says: A timber raft with 40 persons on board was dashed to pieces in the rapids of Adniepol. All perished.

The British commissioner received a letter from Abdurrahman Kahn on Friday last, expressing a strong desire for a friendly settlement. Abdurrahman has with him less than 1,000 troops, horse and foot, and six guns, and the chiefs and Moliks of Logar loudly declare against Abdurrahman as Ameer, but want Yokoob or his son.

Yakoob Khan has plenty of ammunition except gun caps, of which several millions were sent from Weshp, where they were recently seized by the Persian authorities.

The Shah of Persia returns thanks to the British Minister at Teheran for having sent stringent orders to prevent the export of munitions of war.

A correspondent telegraphs that Russia's efforts to induce Portugal and Japan to aid her in the event of war with China proved fruitless.

A Paris dispatch says: It is calculated that only nine persons are excluded from amnesty; but they will get free pardon.

An official decree is published granting the full remission of sentences to all individuals convicted of participation in the insurrection of 1870 and 1871, and the subsequent insurrection movement.

Lieutenant Frances V. Green, of the United States Army, military attaché with Grand Duke Nicholas, during the Russia-Turkish war, has been decorated with the order of the Star of Roumelia.

Goschen obtained a settlement of several long standing matters in which the Porte is indebted to English subjects.

The capture of Arica by the Chileans is considered a death blow to the hopes of Peru, but President Pirola still urges war to the bitter end, and is taking most energetic measures.

Election returns from the interior of Cuba show that General Gonzales is far ahead of all competitors and is without doubt elected President.

LONDON, 14.—The *Pall Mall Gazette* says: The line of policy announced by Parnell and his seventeen supporters, to move to report progress when the compensation for the disturbance in Ireland bill is again discussed, evidently leads to indefinite obstruction. It is easy to declare it to be intolerable that a minority of Home Rulers, who are themselves a very small minority of the House, are not only to impose their policy in Irish legislation, but are to be at liberty, if resisted, to stop English legislation; but the remedy is not so easy. The forms of the House may be and ought to be amended; but even if the disturbance bill is thrown out to-morrow and Parnell suspended for the rest

of the session, the only result would be to make the agitation more certain and dangerous when the session is over. This is the feature in the situation to which serious men on both sides should address their minds. Irish constituents must be taken into account as well as Irish members. If the session ends without something being done to disarm the hostility of this awkward group the parliamentary discomfort of summer will turn into something far more practical and more dangerous during the coming autumn and winter.

The illumination in Paris, tonight is very brilliant, and the streets are thronged. Petards are let off in all directions. Gambetta made a tour through the central quarters and was received with immense enthusiasm wherever he appeared. The Place de la Bastille is in a blaze of many colored lights, and the avenues and streets near it are lit like the day. In all quarters of the city the principal buildings and squares are illuminated. Many beautiful and artistic transparencies are displayed, besides a grand concert at Troadero, which is attended by from 15,000 to 20,000 people. Musical performances on a grand scale are going on in the different districts of the city. Vast crowds are at these performances. The streets, although full of patriotic exultation and excitement, are very orderly. The grand opening ceremony of the national fete took place in the Hippodrome at Longchamps this afternoon. President Grevy, accompanied by a brilliant staff, reviewed the troops and delivered new colors to the regiments in the presence of 100,000 people. President Grevy, on presenting the flags, said the army had become to France a guarantee for the respect due her and for the peace which she desired to preserve. At the conclusion of his speech, which occupied only a few minutes, there were enthusiastic cheers and shouts of "Vive la Republique," "Vive l'Armee," "Vive Grevy," and a scene of patriotic enthusiasm.

In compliance with the advice of the king and the Powers, Premier Tricoupis, of Greece, has withdrawn the decree calling out the reserves.

Information from Constantinople received to-day, indicates that the Porte will reply courteously, but evasively to the collective note, and prepare to wage an official war.

Admiral Lessofsky and staff have started for Moscow, whence they will go to meet the cruiser *Europe* to join the Pacific squadron, of which Admiral Lessofsky will take the command.

The German ambassador had an audience with the Sultan to-day. The ambassadors of European powers will meet to-morrow to sign the collective note.

Prince Nicholas, of Montenegro, ordered his troops to keep on the defensive, as he desires to act only by diplomatic means, but desperate fighting is apprehended.

The elections for the provincial parliament of Australia, resulted in the defeat of the ministry.

LONDON, 15.—An explosion occurred at 1:20 this morning, in the London and South Wales colliery company's new black vein pit at Riser, six miles from Newport. The shock was very violent. It is supposed that 119 men were in the pit at the time, and there is scarcely a probability that any will be saved. One body has been found at the bottom of the shaft. Ventilation has been restored in the mine with a view to exploring for bodies.

A Pera dispatch says: A Montenegrin agent informed the Porte and foreign ambassadors that an Albanian attack on Montenegrin positions is imminent.

A dispatch from Cardiff says one hundred and twenty eight were in the pit of the London and South Wales Colliery Company's mine at the time of the explosion, and it is believed all perished.

A Bome dispatch says: At the municipal elections in Viceregnia the clericals have returned a majority of their candidates. They have also gained a great victory at Venice, returning clericals. Only five liberals are returned in the Chamber of Deputies. The financial provisions to meet any deficit to which the abolition of the grist tax may occasion has been voted by 178 to 78.

LONDON, 15.—Further news from the colliery explosion says: While the men were at work yesterday evening the atmosphere was noticed to be heavy and overcharged. The colliery is the property of the London & South Wales Colliery company. The scenes about the mine

are reported heartrending. There is a large throng of people present, composed in a great part of relatives and friends of the imprisoned miners. Among them are many women who are bewailing the fate of husbands and sons, while little children are asking anxiously concerning their fathers. Everything possible is being done to expedite the rescue of the men, but scarcely any one hopes to find one of the miners alive.

It is thought that 200 colliers were in the mine. At 5 p. m. only three bodies had been recovered. The pit is 280 yards deep. All the machinery was new. The black vein seam is old and well known in connection with the previous explosion, in 1860, which killed 145 persons.

The examination of the company's books shows 120 men descended into the pit for the night shift.

A tremendous thunder storm broke over Panama on the 30th ult. Five buildings were struck by lightning and more or less damaged, but fortunately no loss of life. The cathedral was struck twice, the windows shattered, and several valuable monuments in the interior broken to pieces. The storm was the most severe which has been experienced here for many years.

News from Central American republics continue favorable to the peace and progress of the different States.

The President of the Salvador and Honduras has gone to Guatemala to be present with President Barrios at the opening to traffic of the Guatemala Railroad, which event took place on the 19th of June, and was celebrated with great eclat. The road is from the port of San Jose on the Pacific to the town of Escuintla, about 30 miles inland, on the road to the capital and nearly half way. The successful completion of this road is looked upon as the inauguration of a system of railroads throughout the republic which cannot but prove a vast benefit.

Nicaragua is rejoicing over her late successful contract for the Inter-oceanic canal, at the same time prosecuting energetically the work on her first effort at railroad building—the short line from the Port of Carinto to the Pacific to the town of Chanandego.

The most important news from the South is the announcement that Peru and Bolivia are about to enter into confederation and become one country, under one flag and one government; and to be known as the United States of Peru and Bolivia. The preliminary basis of the union are already drawn up and signed in Lima.

The German ambassador to Turkey presented on Thursday the collective note to the Porte.

Reports continue to come from the provinces of floods involving loss of live stock, damage to various crops and some loss of life.

Goschen continues to urge the Porte to satisfy the claims of Montenegro and I understand on excellent authority that the latter is now disposed to offer territory near Dulcigno in exchange for the disputed territory.

The state of affairs in Constantinople is regarded as most critical, the new war minister having pronounced strongly in favor of resistance to the decisions of the Berlin conference.

A Cabul dispatch says: Abdurrahman Khan has crossed the Hindoo Kosh with a small following and arrived at Tutordarrah.

Scutari, 15.—Albanian leaders secretly decided to take the offensive some days ago. On Sunday night last, 70 clansmen were sent by a circuitous route to fall on the rear of the Montenegrin position near Golbusche. On Monday morning they surprised a picket of 16 Montenegrins only six of whom escaped, and they badly wounded. Simultaneously an attack was made on the Montenegrin front. The 70 clansmen returned to the camp with 13 Montenegrin heads and about 20 rifles and ammunition cases. A mountaineer just arrived reports the renewal of the attack at Blementi, near Divosi. He says 28 Montenegrin heads, three of them officials, were brought in. Cannon firing is heard here this evening. The Albanian clans are hurrying to the front. The committee here has telegraphed to a powerful Dibra tribe for 5,000 men. The league is undergoing important development. The committee at Prizerend has summoned a great council of the Albanian nation to meet there and concert measures for the future. The Turkish governor here continues to support the leaguers, and Hodobosq, the Albanian commander-in-chief, continues to receive pay as a

Turkish officer. The attack causes great excitement. The Prince of Montenegro can scarcely restrain his warriors pending his appeal to Europe.
