## WILL BE THE GRANT SCHOOL

The New Fourth Ward Building Nominally by the Board Last Night.

Plans for Poor House Meeting in the Anti-Saloon Chapter Room—(Continued Report—Continued).

All of the members of the school board were present at the meeting last night and an impressive amount of business was transacted.

Appropriations to town were voted by Mrs. E. C. Houston, Mrs. John Collier, Mr. L. H. Hanson, Dr. G. G. Glazier and Mrs. Lou. M. Jones. Recession Joseph Stevens offered to act as a temporary trustee in the board for \$500.

Wanted to Kill Himself.

BURNED TO THE GROUND.

The Horn Silver Mine Holding Works Completely Destroyed.

Weld miners from Provo, Utah, had the unpleasant concentrating place and holding works at that place were completely destroyed by fire last night. It is supposed that the fire was the work of an incendiary. The loss is estimated at \$1,000.00 and no damage was caused. During the progress of the reorganization the miners had been working and turned down to a depth of present unknown. This mine is filled with smoke and a thorough investigation will be right impossible at this time. Two others and one smaller were also destroyed. All of the men were rescued from the mine but six, and they were obliged to walk through the air shaft. About 100 men were thrown out of employment by the fire.
