

Island, during the present session of Congress, the free raw material she needs; it will be given her. Representative Campbell is to speak.

Mr. Cleveland spoke half an hour in a loud and clear tone, and was listened to with close attention, each paragraph being given time to rest and digest. His defense reference to tariff reform, was the signal for a burst of cheering, and thereafter he was interrogated again and again on his policies and views. The audience was evidently thoroughly in sympathy with the speaker throughout his discussion on the tariff. At the close of his speech he was greeted with prolonged applause.

Ex-Governor James E. Campbell, of Ohio, followed, and spoke by arrangement securing the large hall in preference and preventing the Democrats from using it. He then took up and answered New York's questions at Lincoln and Providence. Questioning, he said, had not yet been a single topic of interest in the meeting. The Ex-Governor Campbell's speech was received sympathetically, but with some opposition. It was several times interrupted with laughter. At the close of the speech, the meeting was adjourned. Ex-President Cleveland was present and cheered when he crossed the street.

Cheered almost with President Andrew of Brown University, and was then adjourned. The meeting was opened again at 7 o'clock this morning and after a hearty storm of rain passed into the building and filled past the eaves. President. He entered into immediate discussion with the speakers and the audience passed from his form, when it was thoroughly exhausted before it was over.

IN GERMANY.

The Ministerial changes definitely completed.

BERLIN, April 2.—The ministerial changes arising out of the recent elections have been definitely completed by the appointment of Dr. Hartwig as Minister of Justice of the empire, as secretary of State. The powers of Count von Bulow as president of the Council of State were transferred to Dr. Hartwig.

The Chancellor has now opportunity at the chance to show his hostility by a selection of himself. The National-Liberals and Prussian party will be in the minority in the ministry, but will still give the appointment this year as part of the new bourgeois ministerial arrangement. The whole question of the political principles of industrial democracy and chief of the Prussian ministry, and the standardization of the peasant education, will be warmly discussed. Count von Bulow, however, as president of the ministry disappointed everybody who knew his old form as we saw him. He is to be the author of the improvements that will become a forcible rival of Chancellor von Caprivi. The intimate friends of the latter saw nothing in Dr. Hartwig's appointment, however, but a desire to strengthen the new chief with the work of the Chancellor and foreign affairs, and then

the present session of the Landtag will close on the 15th. The members are baffled and dubious over the withdrawl of the Prussian party. If the allowance for the President of the Council is delayed, it will be brought before the new Landtag.

Dr. Hartwig, however, as secretary of state, in a recent speech at Eisenach announced that the resumption of the Education bill would be the foremost plank in the school programme of the new ministerial department. This was sent to the various containing a similar intimation.
