WILL READJUST RATES.

Missouri Traffic Officials to Meet for This Purpose.

St. Louis, Mo., March 10.-A con-erence of the executive traffic of-cials of the Missouri lines has been Include of the Missouri lines has been called here for tomorrow to consider the action to be taken in the restora-tion of passenger rates. The general passenger agents have decided to re-commend full restoration of rates to the chief traffic executives as early in monitor.

ocal tariffs can be restored on days notice and all lines have made the necessary preparations in detail in tariff posting and distrubition as soon as authority is given by the higher officials to put in the old rates.

While it is believed that action in While it is believed that action in that regard will be unanimous some of the lines are favoring a rate of two and one-half cents por mile for the main lines and three cents for the branches. They contend that if such a policy should be adopted the state authorities would abandon all steps for an appeal to the supreme court of the United States and all further rate illustion would be droped further rate litigation would be dropp.

TRACKS TO BE RAISED.

In view of the encroachment of the lake to within 14 inches of the tracks of the Western Pacific along the south shore, the roadbed will be raised 25 inches for five and a half miles where laid in the lake, at a cost of \$15,000. Two construction trains and 30 men will be put to work next week.

BETTER ROAD BED.
