THE SALAD SEASON: SOME GOOD RECIPES

SPANISH SALAD.

Peel and slice four medium-sized to-matoes and seed and shred fine one small green pepper. Arrange these on lettuce leaves in a salad-bowl; stone and slice a dozen olives and mix them through the salad. Have all ice-cold. and slice a dozen clives and mix them through the salad. Have all ice-cold. Make a French dressing, adding to it a teaspoonful of minest clives or a dozen. teaspoonful of minced oices, or a doz-en drops of onion-juice, and pour this over the salad about five minutes be-fore it is to be eaten. Mix it well with the salad before serving.
