with 2 divisions up the Derbytown road. The enemy retreated as he advanced, and Birney has reached and occupied the entrenchments which the enemy took from Kautz and were fortifying for themselves. Our loss was smallnot over one eighth of that of the enemy. We have about 100 prisoners.

[Signed.] BUTLER. Headquarters, 10th Army corps, 7. We have repulsed the attack of the enemy on our right flank with great slaughter. The troops seem to be Field's and Pickett's divisions. I am extending my right flank. The enemy seem to be entrenching on the Derby road. [Signed,]

BIRNEY. Headquarters, Department of Virginia Birney has regained Kautz's old position, and holds the enemy in his inner line of entrenchments around Richmond, extending from the

Derbytown road to connect with Weitzel on the eleft, near Fort Harrison. There has been no movement at Petersburg to-day. We have had much the best of this day's work. One thousand at least of the enemy were killed and wounded, 100 taken prisoners, and a bloody repulse.

The Commercial's special says, large numbers of prisoners are daily brought in from the front to City Point. Three hundred wounded arrived at Washington to-day-mostly from the 5th

The Tribune's special says, Hon. W. Kellogg, just from Sheridan's army, reports that our forces had gathered immense quantities of grain and forage, and that supplies of every kind are abundant.

New York, 9. Late rebel papers say the Union lines now en-close many residences never before within the hostile lines and all details for civil and other service have been revoked-every man-old and young-capable of bearing arms is being dragged into the ranks.

The Examiner of the 6th says, the enemy's position below Richmond is about II1/2 miles from the corporation limits and 11/2 miles from our lines.

A dispatch dated in the field, near Aiken's Landing, 7th, says, quite a severe engagement took place this morning between a force of the enemy and our troops on the north side of James river, in which we suffered considerable loss in men and materials, including 2 batteries of 4 guns—each brigade being driven back from its advanced position gained 10 days ago.

It will be remembered that our troops crossed the James river at that time and succeeded in

driving the enemy from the lower part of Chapin's Bluff, taking several guns. Attempts were afterwards made by the rebels to recapture the lost ground, but they were repulsed. Our army since that time had intrenched itself and had considered the position perfectly secure. A force of cavalry under Kautz co-operated in all the movements and was reported at one time as being within a mile or two of Richmond, but had to fall back. Since then he has been protecting the right flank of the army, his men being so strung out that they presented a weak line to the foe.

About 6 o'clock this morning a sudden attack was made on this cavalry force from nearly every direction and, although they were completely taken by surprise, they made every effort to hold the ground, but were finally forced to retreat, leaving 2 batteries without support, the entire guns of which fell into the enemy's hands. They were the 4th Wisconsin and 1st United States. The latter is said to have fired all their ammunition and then, finding they

The engagement commenced on the Derby-town road and was continued on the New Market road, near which the right of the 10th corps rested. The assault on this part of the line was so desperate that it was forced back some distance, but the ground was afterwards recovered, with heavy loss to the enemy. This ended the fight, although picket skirmishing continued all day. Our loss was considerable, as some of our cavalry was completely surrounded.

The enemy's loss was also severe. We took about 700 prisoners, mostly belonging to Long-street's command. Some of them present the appearance of lately being called into the ser-
