

team to represent each. The annual convention of riflemen will be held at Creedmore on Friday, May 24, for the purpose of organization. The secretary was directed to notify all clubs and request them to forward at once the number of members and names of representatives whom they will send to the convention.

WASHINGTON, 2.—The comparative statement of the aggregate of certificates of deposit received each month thus far during the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1877 and 1878, shows a decrease to March 31st, 1878, of \$5,403,588. The total receipts for 1877 were \$118,909,997.

The *World's* Washington correspondent has interviewed Blair. He declared that he was actuated wholly in this step by his sense of public justice. He had no complaint to make of Hayes personally. He was always treated well by him, and he has always treated him civilly, and he had asked nothing of him—neither did he want anything from Tilden, and had said so to him when he believed that he was elected. Despite Blair's confidence his prospects in Congress are very dubious. There are not a dozen members probably who would vote to reopen the count.

The remains of Madame Restell were taken to Tarrytown, to-day, for interment. Only her relatives, counsel, and servants attended the funeral.

LOUISVILLE, 2.—In the thousand mile walking match between Fisher of Canada and Sidrom of Chicago, at 10 o'clock to-night, Fisher completed his 700th mile in eight minutes and twenty-three seconds. Sidrom has walked 686 miles.

SAN FRANCISCO, 2.—In accordance with instructions received from the authorities at Washington, Collector Shannon has granted the Costa Rican steamer *Yazu*, late *Pelican*, clearance papers this morning. This afternoon shipping articles were signed by the officers and crew, and the steamer will probably sail to-morrow morning for Costa Rica. She carries no cargo except store and coal.

NEW YORK, 3.—The *Herald* has the following on the election in Long Island City, yesterday: Shortly before the closing of the polls in Blissville Ward, Lewis Smith, ex-police sergeant, became enraged, for some reason, and fired three shots from his revolver into the crowd. One shot took effect on Patrick Poles, who fell. He was conveyed to his home in Dutch Hills. His injury will probably not prove fatal. At the third shot the pistol exploded, badly lacerating Smith's hand. The crowd then set upon and would have lynched him but for the interference of Sergeant Carroll who rescued Smith and lodged him in the station house.

The *World's* Louisiana special says: Arrangements have been made by the Louisville Jockey Club for a race, to take place here on the fourth, between Harper's "Tenbroeck" and the California mare, "Mollie McCarthy." The race is to be one of four mile heat, for \$10,000. Both horses are said to be in fine condition, and as "Mollie" has never been beaten, unusual interest in felt in the result of the race. Both horses have already won races of four mile heats, "Mollie McCarthy" in 743 and 742, when she was four years old, "Tenbroeck," as a five year old, winning in 742 and 740.

The *World*, speaking of the Long Island city election, says: Fraud is charged on both sides. A New York politician told the *World* reporter that he had sent 100 men to Long Island city, and that all of them had voted, but he did not say for whom.

As yet but few applications have been made to cover war risks on British and Russian hulls and cargoes, and no uniform rate has been fixed. At marine insurance offices the inquiry mainly comes from bankers, and insurances have been effected, at their request, to cover letters of credit for the purchase of goods in the Baltic, French and Mediterranean ports, at 1 per cent. by steam and 1/2 per cent. by sail. For full range of the Baltic 1/2 of one per cent. The Atlantic, Great Western and Pacific companies report but little inquiry, and the rate generally asked is from 1/2 to 1 per cent., covering long voyages, first mention of which name two per cent. on Black Sea risks.

A dispatch to the *Tribune*, from Dublin, states that the assassination of Lord Leitrim and his two attendants was the result of agra-

rian troubles. Lord Leitrim had a dispute lately with his tenantry, some of whom manifested much bitter feeling at their alleged grievances. There is intense indignation among the people of Donegal County over the outrage, and measures are being taken to discover the perpetrators.

A special from Washington says several senators have, of late, discussed among themselves the propriety of preparing a joint resolution which should express the deep regret of the people of the United States at the prospect of serious misunderstanding and interruption of peaceful relations between the people of Great Britain and Russia, and request the President to use all means, as far as he can consistently with his constitutional duty, to aid in restoring relations of amity and confidence between the two governments and the people, to one of whom we are bound by common ancestry and language and similar institutions; while with the other we have ties of an ancient and unbroken friendship. It is proposed to discuss with Secretary Evarts the propriety or usefulness of such a joint resolution before it is drawn up.

In regard to the resolution of the Maryland legislature to contest the title of President Hayes, prominent democrats in Congress say they do not believe there are ten representatives, and not a single democratic Senator in favor of them. Montgomery Blair, however, is industriously at work.

NYACK, N. Y., 3.—The receiver of the Rockland Savings Bank has brought suit against the trustees of the bank as trustees and as individuals, for \$33,000, the amount embezzled by the president, secretary, vice-president, and other officers of the institution, claiming that the trustees are liable for the negligence in allowing the money of the bank to be embezzled by its officers.

#### A Baby Saving its Mother's Life.

M. and Madam Henri Schneider went to the ball given on the occasion of the marriage of the King of Spain. It is a considerable distance from Madrid to Creuzot, and Madam Schneider, on arriving at home a few days ago, was greatly fatigued. Two days and two nights of railroad travel had completely exhausted her. It was evening, and she told her servants that she needed complete repose, and added: "Above all things let nobody come into my room to-morrow morning before I ring the bell." However, during the absence of Madam Schneider her people had proposed a surprise for her. They at last succeeded in making her little daughter walk. The child was a rosy baby who, up to that time, had not been able to advance a single step. They were anxious to show Madame Schneider the newly acquired accomplishment of her baby, but the orders were strict, and this was a great disappointment. But in the morning the nurse could no longer hold out. She thought that the mother would forgive an indiscretion so well justified, and notwithstanding the order, she knocked at the door. There was no response. She went in and staggered back uttering a cry. Madame Schneider was stretched upon her bed motionless, and apparently dead. She was suffocated. A crack was opened in the wall through which the smoke from the chimney entered the bedroom. An hour later and nothing could have saved her. It was three hours before she became conscious. She is not yet completely restored. But had it not been for the good fortune of the first steps of that baby! However, we are happy to announce that she is out of danger.—*Moniteur Universel*.
