LIVELY RUMBLE.

A lively rumble occurred yesterday afternoon on Twenty-seventh street when Dr. G. W. Perkins' horse ran away, demolishing the vehicle. The doctor was visiting one of his patients. He had to leave the horse loose and gone into the house when something frightened the animal and it broke loose. The buggy collided with two telegraph poles tearing the top from the buggy and demolishing the wheels, also the harness. The horse was caught a short distance down the street by J. S. Corley. It had several cuts on its legs and severe bruises. The damage to the outfit will amount to about \$50.

STORE BURGLARIZED.

Ogden, Utah, Sept. 29.—The case of Anna M. Nelson against David M. Smith was on trial yesterday and today before Judge Howell and a jury. The suit was brought by Mrs. Nelson to recover \$2,500 alleged to be due for personal injuries. The witnesses examined yesterday were Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Anderson, Wheelwright, and Josephine Combs. They testified that they, too, decided to go out towood Park one evening, and in passing along Quincy avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets the plaintiff tripped over a rope to which defendant had a calf tied across the street. She fell to the ground sustaining several serious injuries. They testified that the night was dark so they could not see the rope until the accident had happened.

The divorce suit of Albert Landen against May Landen was heard by Judge Howell. The plaintiff testified that he was married to defendant in Kansas and that two children were born as issue of their marriage. That a year ago his wife took the two children and deserted him and since then has been guilty of infidelity of his wife or of the children. The decree was granted.

In the case of Charilla A. Browning Welch against Stephen Browning, the motion for judgment by default was granted.

Frank Johnson charged with assault with a deadly weapon on Aug. 17, 1905, when it is alleged he cut Albert J. Taylor with a knife, was arraigned before Judge Murphy for assault and battery on his wife. They are Gypsies.
