LOCAL BRIEFS.

The level of the great lake is fully one foot lower than the zero mark, or one foot lower than it was a year ago at this time.

The ward choir of Pioneer stake are requested to meet in the stake house at 7:30 tonight, to practice hymns for the stake conference.

The first of the series of entertainments to be given by the Y. M. C. A. this fall and winter will be given in the Salt Lake Theatre Oct. 25, in a concert by a saxophone quartet.

City Chemist Burns has just made an analysis of the waters of Parley's canyon and City creek. Parley's water he finds of "good" purity, and the City creek water he finds of "excellent" purity.

Section Director R. J. Hyatt, of the weather office, has returned from a trip to Grand Junction, and points along the line, inspecting local voluntary weather stations. He found them all in a satisfactory condition.

The following petitions have been filed with the attorney-general from the state prison for action by the board of pardons: Frank Wilson, pardon or parole sentence, April 23, 1904, for burglary to five years in the state prison for arson; John Plummer, commutation of sentence to nine years, sentenced Sept. 11, 1900, from Ogden, to 13 years imprisonment for rape.

Senator Bamberger has settled the matter of a tunnel in the market street tracks by laying a straight track through the street and putting in the turnout on the north side of the roadway adjoining the property of the senator himself. This leaves the roadway abutting on the property of the petitioners for the injunction on the south side entirely unobstructed.

There will be a civil service examination in this city Nov. 1, for the position of interpreter in the immigration service, the languages required being Roumanian, Polish, Italian, French, German and Magyar, and the station of service Baltimore. With \$1,000 salary. There will also be an examination Nov. 5, for the position of railway mail clerk, age limit 18 to 35 years.

Clyde Leavitt of the forestry department at Washington is in the city, having been here to investigate the proposition to set aside certain districts of the state as forest reserves. Mr. Leavitt has been in Montana, where he found it advisable to recommend the creation of three new forest reserves in the southeastern part of the state, and comprise a total of 700,000 acres.

Mrs. Charlotte Lindstrom Estebom of this city is anxiously searching for a son, from whom she has heard no tidings in five years. His name is Carl Johan Lindstrom, and the last information came from him when he was in Chicago. He is a lumberman by calling, and may be in one of the big lumber camps of the country. His mother has tidings for him that will be of interest to him and is very desirous of ascertaining his whereabouts.

At a meeting of the Junior class of the Salt Lake High school last night, the following class officers were elected for the year: Charles Hines, president; Margaret Parsons, secretary, and Scott Kimball as treasurer. The executive committee will consist of Vaughn Paul, Charles Snyder, Margaret Horrik, George Critchlow, and John Leifursson. The class this year numbers nearly 175 students, a large gain over that of last year.

The board of governors of the Commercial club met yesterday afternoon, and appointed the following committee to arrange for a conference in this city to divert westward travel that would otherwise go to Europe: Governor Cutler, ex-Gov. Wells, Mayor H. P. Morris, Senator Snyder, Chairman of the Y. M. C. A., Mr. O'Connell, John J. Johnson, Fisher S. Harris. The time for holding the conference will rest with the committee. The conference will bring here the governors of a number of western states, and mayors of western cities, and from this meeting considerable is anticipated.

Prof. J. L. Webb of the bureau of entomology at Washington is at the Kenyon from Boise, where he has been at work in the local forests with a corps of assistants, investigating the depredations of the western yellow pine beetle, which has been inflicting the local trees. Prof. Webb says the ravages of the insect have not been very destructive as yet, and believes it can be exterminated. The beetle cuts through the bark and girdles the tree, thus causing a stoppage of the flow of sap. The only effectual way to kill the insect is to cut down affected trees in the winter when the insect is dormant, and burn the bark.

W. M. Elliot is back from a lumber trip to the northwest, and reports a business far beyond the capacity of the railroads to handle the lumber crop. Mr. Elliot says there are 25,000,000 bushels of wheat in Washington state this year, and he thinks the Northern Pacific line cannot handle the wheat crop. There are no other purposes than hauling this great output of grain. Thus for 30 days the lumbermen will be forced to use the best they can under the circumstances. Mr. Elliot says there is a big Atlantic trade in lumber, which will take all the spare stuff within reach, and on the whole the lumbermen are just now finding the biggest trade in the history of the industry.
