Prof. J. L. Webb of the bureau of entomology at Washington is at the Kenyon from Boise, where he has been at work in the local forests with a corps of assistants, investigating the depradations of the western yellow placted, which has been injuring the local trees. Prof. Webb says the raveges of the insect have not been very destructive as yet, and believes it can be exterminated. The beetle cut through the bark and girdles the tree thus causing a stoppage of the flow of sap. The only effectual way to kill off the insect is to out down affected trees in the winter when the insect is dor-

mant, and burn the bark. W. M.
