For a considerable time the convietion has been growing that electric development is destined to check the flow of population to cities. Of extraordinary interest in this connection is the experi-ment at Hollriegelsgerent, a small vilage near Munich, where the water-pow-er of the river Isar is being used to generate electric current for agricul-tural and other small industries over an extensive area, A total of 25 firms and 90 premises of various kinds, in 21 villages and rural districts, are now supplied light and power.
