Two-Year-Old Child Killed by a Rattlesnake Bite.

FATAL FALL OF AN IDAHO HUNTER.

Died in the Storm—Idaho Floods—Drowned in a Slough—Killed and Buried.

A forty-two year old man, who had been sold to a Michigan man for \$100,000, A. M. Hoy was the owner and the tree was twelve years old.

A popular vote will be taken in Spokane, Wash., on the question of a new \$100,000 for the construction of an electric lighting plant to be owned and operated by the city.

Edwin Hallow, foreman of the Yuma ranch near Turlock, Cal., on the banks of the San Joaquin river, was drowned in a slough Tuesday morning by falling from his horse while attempting to ford the stream after cattle.

There has been a riot strike in the Humberston mountains, about twelve miles from White Sulphur, near the Fortuna and Mongol Cal mines, and four miles from the Southern Pacific. It is reported to be the most serious since the strike of the territory, and miners are much excited over it.

A proposition has been made to the city council of San Diego, a large contractor of Chicago and St. Louis, to provide that city with a municipal electric lighting plant of capacity of 100,000 candle-power at a cost of \$1,000,000, and a consideration of the proposition is now pending.

The steamer City of Puebla, which arrived at Port Townsend, Washington, Monday night from San Francisco, had a peculiar experience Saturday. While steaming some 20 miles off the coast, about twenty miles off the Oregon coast, the vessel was attacked and a few minutes later was surrounded by a large number of attacking birds. Over 300 birds were captured by passengers and crew.

Ats, Cal., Advocate Joe Anderson told some time ago that he had a hen that laid two eggs a day. He has not yet told the story, but the hen has accomplished what he said she would, and any one who doubts the story can find them on exhibition in his office. The eggs are perfect, and the hen is a very fine specimen, excepting the portion that joins the two together.

The orange shipments from Riverside, Cal., last week amounted to 27,000 boxes, one of the heaviest for the season. This brings the total for the season up to 553,525 boxes, or 1975 carloads of twenty tons each. This is only thirty-five carloads short of the total for the season last year. The oranges are all coming up, but the seedlings and late harvest varieties are likely to bring the season's total up to 5,500 carloads.

Pocahontas, Idaho, Tribune: "Uncle Billy" Smith has been a very successful man in the west. He reports a very fine business, but says that the whole south-western part of the state seems to be under water. At Weaver, no one has a fish, and a man was drowned yesterday and his wife was a house floating down the river, which was about two or three miles wide. The farmers on the low lands around Weaver, Payette and Boise are all flooded and many of the bridges have gone out all over that section.

The charred remains of Bernardino Amodeo, a Mexican, about 35 years of age, were found in the ashes of his hut, near Hollister, Cal., by a janitor named Joe Derosa last Saturday morning. It is positive that Amodeo was murdered, for the body, though badly charred, had a gunshot wound in the chest, made by an ex. or some other sharp instrument. The body was evidently thrown into the burning hut to conceal the evidence of the crime. There is no clue to the murderer.

The two-year-old son of Francis Figo, who resides in the hills some seven miles from Livermore, Cal., ran into the house on Saturday with its head bleeding. The mother, thinking it had been cut by a knife or some sharp instrument, carried the child off, where she noticed that the head was swelling and was turning black. He called his father, who took him to the lake, where the child had been playing and found a young rattlesnake on the foot. The child was immediately taken to town and placed under a physician's care, but died in great agony a few hours later.

The Aero Light saloon at Buena Vista, collapsed on Monday night, killing Herbert Adams and injuring several other persons who were in the saloon. There were thirteen men in the wrecked building at the time when the crash came, and it seemed wonderful that more were not killed. The collapse came without warning. There was no fire, and the report that the roof crashed in the floor. The crash was followed by a roar as the walls tumbled in all directions. The cause of the accident is unknown, but it seems probable that it resulted from weakening of the walls by the action of time, making them insufficient for the support of the heavy load.

For several months past negotiations have been pending between a syndicate of British capitalists and the owners of the street railway lines in Oakland, Cal., looking to the purchase and consolidation of all the street railways there. The big deal which involved the purchase of nearly millions of dollars' worth of property, has fallen through, and the explanation is advanced by some of the interested parties that the failure of the negotiations was directly attributable to the financial condition of the London Municipal market, resulting from the post-war depression.

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
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
