Business Report.

New York, 16.—The Clearing
House exchange for the week

Commenting upon these figures
the Public says:

It is a little singular that the ex-
changes for the second week of
August show an unusual increase in
New York, and at the same time an
unusual decrease at other cities.

The disturbance last year caused by
the anxiety regarding the Free-
dome of Commerce bill, and the un-
usually different cities. The tem-
per of business in the in-
terior is still hesitating, but the
greater extent of the business in
New York is willing to believe. The men
who have fall and spring faith that
everything is going altogether well
this year are not many outside of
speculative circles. Hence, pur-
chases are not quite as liberal, nor
is the distribution of manufactured
products quite as satisfactory as
business desire. There was great im-
provement during July, as a strong
reaction from the excessive depres-
sion, but later news and sober sec-
ond thoughts have made merchants
more cautious about commitments
until the outcome of the crops is
more definitely known.

Political.

E. J. Hammond was renominated
for Congress by the democrats of
the Fifth District of Georgia.

George A. Dargen was nominated
for Congress by the democrats of the
Sixth South Carolina District.

The coalition convention of the
Seventh District of Virginia re-
nominated Joseph N. Paul for Con-
gress.

The Democratic State Convention
of Iowa assembled yesterday at
Marshalltown. A temporary or-
ganization was effected with Judge
W. C. James in the chair. Com-
mittees were appointed, when a
recess was taken.

The democrats of the Third Dis-
trict of Missouri nominated Col-
onel Dickey for Congress, and the
Thirteenth District of Missouri
nominated Judge W. H. Lyon for
Congress.

The republicans of the Eighth
District of Kentucky nominated
Wm. O. Bradley for Congress, yester-
day.

The Anti-Monopoly State Com-
mission of New York called a Ses-
sion of the Senate at Saratoga, Sep-
tember 15.

The republicans of the Seventeenth
District of Illinois yesterday nomi-
nated C. H. Barlow for Congress.

The prohibitionists of the Seventh
Congressional District of Wisconsin
have nominated Major B. F. Parker.
Chas. J. Williams was renominated
for Congress in the First District
of Wisconsin, yesterday, on the first
ballot.

The democrats of the Fifth Dis-
trict of South Carolina nominated
J. J. Hompesch for Congress, and
the democrats of the Fourth Dis-
trict nominated E. Evans.

General A. B. Hecron was nomi-
nated for Congress yesterday in the
Sixth District of Louisiana.

Chas. T. O'Connell was nomi-
nated by the democrats of the Sixth
Congressional District of Virginia.

The Republican Reunion of the
Eighth Congressional District of
Virginia have nominated J. Henry
Ryan for Congress.

St. Louis, 16.—The Greenback
party of the Second Missouri Dis-
trict nominated Colonel William Foye,
and the Greenbackers of the Twelfth
District nominated Gage S. Spring
for Congress. Greenback nomi-
nations thus far made are: G.
M. Jackson in the Tenth District,
Ira S. Hamilton renominated in the
Thirteenth District and Bol G.
Kitchen in the Fourteenth.

Marshalltown, Iowa, 16.—The
platform adopted at the convention,
to-day, favors civil service reform,
and denounces the extortion of
money from voters by corrupt
and control elections. It denounces
the extravagance of the republican
party, and demands a reduction of
taxes. It declares that existing pro-
hibitory laws are a violation of the
democratic principle of right and
justice; tenders the sympathy of
the democratic party to the oppressed
of all nations, Ireland especially,
in her present struggle to attain her
freedom.

The following was unanimously
adopted:

Whereas, Our chairman, Hon. J.
P. Irish, is about to leave the State
for California;

Resolved, That the democracy of
Iowa will always remember the
valuable services of John P. Irish,
and wherever he goes their best
wishes attend him.

Other resolutions referring to
State matters were adopted and the
convention adjourned.

H. F. Burden, of Johnson Co.,
was nominated for clerk of the Sup-
reme Court, J. A. Palmer, of Henry
County, for Supreme Court reporter,
and Senator Chas. E. Brown, of
Delaware, for Judge of the Supreme
Court.

A telegram was read announcing
the death of Senator Hill, and a
committee to draft resolutions to
forward to the bereaved family was
appointed.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., 16.—At
an early hour yesterday morning an
unknown man ran up to the resi-
dence of Mrs. Rafael A. Podes,
called him to the door and shot him
through the head, killing him in-
stantly. Podes's brother then
appeared at the door, when he, too,
was shot dead by the stranger, who
made his escape.

Kansas City, 16.—Mrs. West was

the cow, being mischievous and ill-
tempered, ran up to Mrs. West and

Providence, R. I., 16.—A Ar-
mus was killed and two laborers

by the upsetting of their canoe.

Brownsville, Tex., 16.—Seven
new cases of yellow fever today, 12
Mexicans and 5 Americans. Three
Americans died. The publication of
the daily papers is suspended, so
many hands being down with the
fever. At Matamoros the number
of cases is decreasing. There were
four deaths reported for the 34 hours
ending at 8 a. m. The weather is
clear.

Strikers.

Local assemblies throughout the
mining region of Maryland yester-
day heard the report of the con-
flict between the operators and
miners and resolved to continue the
strike.

Drunkens Desperados.

DALLAS, TEXAS, 16.—Three young
men of respectable families, named
Walter Chapman, Henry Atkinson,
and Joseph Naper, who have been
suspected of being connected with
several train robberies during the
past year, have been stealing
Wheeler, and then confound to
committing other lawless acts in
B. and O. County for the past 10 days,
and making themselves a terror to
the people. Yesterday they robbed
Oreton's country store, and then
set it on fire and rode away. About
midnight they arrived at the farm-
house of Newhall, routed him out of
bed, made him give them a bottle of
whisky, and then proceeded to
steal his horse and carriage. They
then rode away. A strong posse of
citizens in pursuit of the gang, in
the mule at Newhall's, the old
man was shot in the leg and severely
wounded.

**Dead End Enters the Derby Lat-
er.**

NEW YORK, 16.—The New York
Tribune has the following editorial:
Suspicion grows apace that the im-
pending Derby, alleged to have
been sent to the States by the
inauguration, was never sent to
him at all, and was never written,
indeed, until long after his death.
It is argued with much show of
plausibility that whoever may not
may be he is not a fool, and no
man but a fool would send such an
important letter to a President
whose word will be in doubt as to
its source. The growing belief is
that Dorsey has written the letter
and sent it in the hope of
obtaining a pardon for his
President Arthur, and his influence
in the State route portions. Col-
onel Bliss says that Dorsey at the
time his letter was dated, was ex-
pecting to be pardoned for his
role in the letter, and his influence
was inclined to speak harshly of his
grasping demands.

Banker's Association.

SARASOTA, 16.—The annual
session of the Bankers' Association
to-day, with a very large atten-
dance. Wm. H. Foster, of Salem,
Mass., for 59 years a bank cashier,
was introduced, and then Pres. Coe
of Chicago, and then J. H. L. L. L.
Poland presented a resolution direct-
ing the executive committee to as-
certain the laws of the various
States respecting commercial paper,
and whether or not they may not
make laws governing commercial
paper drawn in one State and pay-
able in another. Adopted.

Prof. A. W. Calk, Grover, and
John Thompson, and A. D. Lynch
then read papers.

The conclusion of Grover re-
garding the proportion of business
done by the banks, and the address
about holiday times, as evidenced
by clearing house figures, was some-
what discussed.

land banks there.

FOREIGN.

THE WAR IN EGYPT.

The Situation at Alexandria.

ALEXANDRIA, 15.—The weather,
contrary to precedent, is becoming
cooler.

The troop ship *Thalia* has arrived
here.

Three English residents who at-
tempted to enter a British Club, at
Schweinfurt's vigilance committee,
were declined.

Waterworks service stopped for
the first time to-day, but will be re-
served for a short time on Wed-
nesday.

Hundreds of people arrive by
steamers daily without any visible
means of subsistence. Provisions
are scarce and prices are high. The
situation is most unsatisfactory at
double rates.

Tuesday being the last day of
Belram, the Khedive held a recep-
tion at his old Tin palace. The
Khedive appeared in his good
guise and referred to passing events
in a light and happy manner. Gen.
Aoye, Admiral and many other
guests visited the Khedive. The
commissariat service is work-
ing smoothly.

The French Consul has under-
taken to guarantee the character of
the correspondent of the Paris news-
paper, who was arrested at the
outposts. He will be released with
a sound warning to be careful
as to his future conduct.

The transport *Calabria* narrowly
escaped wrecking in the harbor, her
rudder chains having broken while
crossing the bar.

The water supply is sufficient to
last several hours.

The ship *Incantation* has ar-
rived in the harbor.

The Duke of Connaught, Sir Ed-
ward Maitland (the British Consul
General) and General Wolsey
visited the Khedive to-day.

A party of Arabs destroyed the
mounds at Ramleh yesterday night.

Soldiers of the 4th regiment to-day
extinguished a fire believed to be
the work of the Khedive's forces.

The native police looked on
but rendered no assistance.

General Allenby held a con-
ference to-day with General Wol-
sey, the result of which is that
he will retain command of the British
troops pending the present delibera-
tions of the conference.

General Wolsey to-day inspected
the military positions at Ramleh
and surveyed the country around
from the tower of the waterworks.
A heavy mine exploded the view
beyond Arab's first line of en-
trenchments.

General Wolsey presided at a
council of war on board the *Salamis*
to-day.

Asabi Loyals.

Constantinople, 15.—It is stated
in Turkish circles that the hesita-
tion to issue a proclamation against
Arab is owing to the fact that a
telegram was received from him a
few days ago, expressing his readi-
ness to submit to the authority of
the Caliph, but stating that he could
not leave his soldiers without a head
until the arrival of the Turkish
troops in Egypt, when he would in-
stantly hand over his command to
the Turkish General. The military
convention is still unsettled for the
moment.

The report that the Ulema de-
posed the Sultan is untrue. On the
contrary, the Sultan, at the Feast
of Belram, yesterday, received
several congratulatory telegrams
from Cairo and other parts in Egypt.

Military Conventions.

The draught of the military con-
vention proposed by the Porte
England, is as follows: The Turkish
army undertakes the pacification of
Egypt without foreign assistance,
service in Egypt to be limited to the
senior position, and not to partici-
pate in operations. The Turks shall
be allowed to use Alexandria as the
base of operations, and the British
and British troops to withdraw
after the pacification of the country.

Duffin rejected this draught and
submitted another, stipulating that
Turkey should not undertake any
operation without the previous con-
sent of the British commander, that
British officers should be attached to
the Turkish headquarters, and that
the question of evacuation should be
the subject of a special convention. It
is believed there is no probability of
the Porte accepting the conditions.

Inconvenient Ally.

London, 16.—A Constantinople
correspondent says: A small body
of cavalry which embarked for ser-
vice in Egypt, at Suez Bay, Aug. 15,
instead of Alexandria, and the A-
banian Infantry battalions which
were ordered to embark at Suez for
received countermanding orders.
