

THE CANNING BUSINESS.

Prices for Fresh Fruit is High and Tomato Crop is Light.

Payette, Idaho, Aug. 10,-In an interlew with L. V. Patch, manager of the Payette cannery, he stated that the ompany had already contracted to sell ill the fruit it could secure or handle it the cannery this season. "Prices for fresh fruit are high," said Mr. Patch, "and where before we paid one cent for pear and peaches this year we will have to pay two. Also it is a very difficult matter to secure what fruit we want at any price. I recenty made a personal trip through the Weiser and Huntington country and we ser and Huntington country and found that I could not secure any fruit in that section at all. The tomato crop, he said, "would not yield much more than 50 per cent of a usual crop, and this is especially the case with the Utah crop. Of course, this will make the prices on this staple article pretty high, and I predict that the price will reach \$2 at the factory. About our pea pack, this has been the best season we have had.
