

SCHOOL BOARD MATTERS.

Proposed Elimination of Pupil's Studies Laid on the Table.

Old Teachers Retired and New Ones Appointed—Teachers Employed for the New Buildings.

The board of education met last night, all of the members being present except Tolson. Publishing is a trifling expense of the business transacted.

Mrs. Nellie M. Trevor, Lima, Ohio, made application for position as teacher. Committee on teachers.

Mrs. Green, Harry Chapman, Wm. H. Mason, H. E. Underwood, Jacob Chaffin, Simon Briggs, Thomas Cripe and Henry W. Hollister also made applications for positions as teachers. Name reference.

Notice was given by John Bryan that he had transferred his name to the committee on teachers to him for serving the La Vene Place school building, Tolson.

The treasurer's statement for the month of July was presented and accepted. Total amount, \$1,211.66. TOLSON'S Warrant paid, \$1,211.66. Balance on hand July 1st, \$1,211.66. Committee on Finance.

The committee on sites and buildings recommended that the following buildings be erected at the Frankfort school for the sum of \$10,000: Accepted. Adopted.

The offer of Tolson & Bryan to excavate a cellar, wait up, paint, roof, put up a door and windows, and furnish them, for the sum of \$200, was received and referred to the committee on sites and buildings.

The Salt Lake Building and Manufacturing Company offered the board the services of their carpenters to strike on the schools they would claim an extension of the time all would then be held. The erection of the Frankfort school, Committee on sites and buildings.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that they had visited the various school buildings and recommended that authority be granted the committee to award contracts for calculating the cost of erecting buildings.

The committee on sites and buildings recommended that authority be given to make a new available for school purposes. Adopted.

The committee on furniture and supplies recommended that the bid of Walker Bros., in Fisher company, of \$12,000 for the new school houses for fixing up the Oquirrh school be accepted.

The committee on furniture and supplies recommended that contracts be awarded for the following school buildings:

Frankfort High School, \$10,000; Grant school, \$10,000; Tolson school, \$10,000; Oquirrh school, \$10,000; Lincoln school, \$10,000; and the Frankfort school, \$10,000.

The committee on furniture and supplies recommended that the designation of the following teacher be accepted:

Jessie McDonald, Winfield Elementary, Constance Townsend, Emma Porter, Jim Davis and Mrs. Clark.

The same committee recommended the employment of the following persons for the maintenance of the schools:

John S. Johnson, \$100 per month; John H. Green, \$100 per month; and Mrs. Anna M. Clark, \$100 per month.
