The demands of the mine workers, which were prepared by a committee of reven, with John Mitchell as chairman, were forwarded to President Baer, thairman of a similar committee represetting the anthracite operators, on Feb.z. They sought to provide for an agreement between the representatives of the United Mine Workers of Ameri-ca and the various anthracite operating companies that contain wages, rates, that certain wages, rates, hours of labor, and conditions of employ-ment, should become effective April 1. 1966, and continue in effect until April 1, 1967,

The proposals included the establish-ment of an eight-hour day for all per-sons covered by the agreement: a re-adjustment of wages, with an increase of 10 meters. per cent above the award made s strike commission for contract niners; a new sliding scale, providing for an increase of 1 per cent in wages for all mine workers affected by the agreement for each increase of 5 cents in the average of a per cent in the average

FIERCE STORMS IN MONTANA.

Helena, Mont, March II.-Reports from all over the state indicate that one of the fiercest storms of the winter is rag-ing. Sundown at Marysville, a few miles west of here, it was 12 below with the wind blowing a gale and a foot of snow on the ground. In the eastern part of the state it is below zero, registering is below at Livingston. At Havre, usually the coldest place in the state, it is six above. The snow is general. Livestock men do not look for any losses of stock unless the storm is of unusual duration.

EDITOR T. E. MCKENNA DEAD.

Denver, Colo., March 11.-Thomas E. McKenna, for many years managing edi-tor of the Rocky Mountain News, died at St. Joseph's hospital in this city last

at st. Joseph's inspirat in this city has night. Mr. McKenna arrived from Redlands, Cal., Friday, and was taken directly to the hospital. There was no hope for him from the moment of arrival. At the bed-side were Mrs. McKenna, John C. Martin and wife and the mother superior. McKenna came to Colorado in 1887 and Johned the staff of the Rocky Moun-bin News. Seven years later he was imade managing editor of that paper, which position he heid for 16 years. On Feb. 11, 1966, Mr. McKenna completed sventeen years of service on the News.
