LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Priesthood Meeting.—The regular monthly meeting of the priesthood of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion will be held in the Assembly Hall on Saturday, December 4th, 1880, at 11 a. m.

Repairs Completed.—The repairs in the heating apparatus of the Assembly Hall are completed, and everything is in order once again. The usual Sunday services of the Latter-day Saints will be held in the building to-morrow afternoon, commencing at 2 o'clock.

Sunday Services.—The Sunday Services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will consist of the following: Sunday schools at 10 a. m.; general meeting in the Assembly Hall at 2 p. m.; ward meetings in the evening as usual.

Home missionaries will visit the country wards during the day.

Last Night of Macallister.—To-night is the last one of the engagement of Macallister, the wizard. His week's series of performances has been very successful. All who have not seen him have one more chance, not only for a pleasing entertainment, but for a valuable present, many of which have been given away to the patrons of the wizard during the last week.

Sisters' Conference.—Sisters S. M. Kimball, E. B. Wells and E. Howard have been attending the Ladies' Conference at Provo, held yesterday. The latter two returned last evening. The meeting, which was well attended and very interesting, was presided over by Sister Mary Johnson, in the absence of Sister M. T. Smoot, who was suffering from a severe cold and could not be present.

Home Again.—President Angus M. Cannon returned to this city from his trip to St. George, Thursday evening, having been gone since the 29th of October. Thanksgiving Day he spent at his farm near the Point of the Mountain, and came to the city the same night. He is looking and feeling first rate and expresses himself as having enjoyed his brief visit better than any other period of his life of equal length. We bid him welcome home.

Cold Weather.—Brother S. P. Richards, of Montpelier, Idaho, writes on the 26th to this effect: "Winter seems to have set in in good earnest. Yesterday and to-day snow has fallen to the depth of six inches and is still coming down. We had fine weather all the way home (from Salt Lake) by storm and severe cold commenced soon after our arrival home. The past week has shown about as cold weather as any experienced last winter, except when the hard winds blew. All well."

Z. M. S.—The regular meeting of Zion's Musical Society will be held in the Council House on Monday evening at 7 o'clock.

The short lecture on the science of music, delivered by Prof. Beesley at the last meeting, was very interesting, and it is expected that the lecture on Monday next, to be given by Brother J. S. Lewis, will be equally edifying. A full attendance of the members is requested, and the directors are specially invited to be present to transact some necessary business.

Accident.—In the 194th Ward at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, Frank Benson, aged seven years, was amusing himself by picking a giant powder cap with a pin. It exploded, blowing the finger and thumb off the left hand and also injured the right. The boy's face was also scorched by the blast of the powder. Dr. Benson, the father of the boy, came down from Ogden on a special engine, but finding the injury was not dangerous, went back soon after arrival. Dr. Joseph Richards is the physician in attendance, under whose treatment the patient is doing well.

The Careless Concert.—On Monday evening, the first concert of the season by the Careless Orchestra, will be given in the Theatre. The programme is published elsewhere and, as will be seen, is a splendid arrangement. In addition to the Orchestra, led by Mr. Careless, Mrs. Jos. Siegel and Mr. R. Gorlinski will appear and render vocal selections; also Miss A. Gierisch, a European lady, will execute a solo upon that beautiful instrument, the zither. It should not be forgotten that Messrs. Dead.—Dr. William Ferguson, of this city, husband of Sister Ellen B. Ferguson, died at 10 o'clock this morning. Deceased was quite aged and for a long time had been feeble in body as well as in mind. Several times in the past few years he has been mentally deranged. He has been suffering for about a week with pneumonia, and gradually succumbed to the disease. He was born March 11th, 1801, in Dockfern House, near Inverness, Scotland. He was for forty years a minister of the Congregational Church, was educated at the University of Edinburgh and graduated in the medical profession, intending to devote his life to foreign missionary work. He emigrated to America in 1860, and during the late war edited a democratic paper in the State of Ohio. He came to Utah in 1878 and took up his abode in this city, residing at the time of his death in the 21st ward.

The funeral will be held at late residence on Tuesday morning, at 11 o'clock.

A Timely Warning.—As the practice of riding bicycles seems to be on the increase rather than the diminish in this community, the following words of caution from a Peoria paper, may not be out of season just here: "Fred Patte, a clerk in the employ of Gilbert the hatter, was out riding on his bicycle, last Sunday. It became frightened at some cars and ran away. The machine became totally unmanageable, and finally threw him off, fell on him, and kicked him several times after he was down. He was finally rescued by the bystanders, his bicycle following him and trying to bite him after they had dragged him from under it. When he was rescued it was found that his arm was broken. The bicycle was taken to a blacksmith shop, as in the struggle it was found that it had dislocated one of its hind legs. This is a warning to young men never to ride a bicycle until it is thoroughly broken. The one that this accident was caused by had been riding in a shed all summer, chained to a post, and it was thought to be perfectly gentle; but it is probable that long confinement and high feed had rendered it more fiery than it was. It would have been if it had been kept in constant use."

From the East.—Brother A. R. Wright, of the 20th Ward, who returned from the East last Saturday, called in this morning. He left here on the 13th of last April, and during his absence has been sojourning in the States of Pennsylvania and Ohio, accompanied by his wife. His main object was to gather genealogical data of his family relatives, but he also did whatever he could to disseminate the principles of the Gospel. They were treated with much kindness by their friends and people generally, and believe they were successful in reminding much prejudice from their minds. In genealogical researches, they were measurably successful. Brother Wright has been sick since his arrival home, but is now able to be out and is feeling pretty well at present. We are glad to see him once more.

A Poisonous Bite.—Two men named Edward Wells and Alexander Jacobson got into a scrimmage at Park City several days ago, during which the former bit his opponent on the cheek. Jacobson was brought to this city for treatment, as the bite was discovered to be poisonous, and erysipelas had set in as a consequence. The case had gone so far that nothing could be done to cure him, and he died on Wednesday last. Wells was charged with manslaughter, the brother of the deceased swearing out a complaint to that effect, and Marshal Shaughnessy was directed to make the arrest. It was found, however, that Wells had absconded from Park City and nothing further of him could be learned. He is still being sought for, and will doubtless come to light before long.
