ed. The water to be used in the system comes from the head of Cottonwood canyon at the foot of Pine Valley moun-tain, through a canal is miles in length. The water has been analyzed and is found to be a pure mountain water, well adapted for cultury pur-poses. It is intended that actual work on the system will begin in the near future.
