G. S. L. CITY, July 2, 1855.

EDITOR OF THE DESERET NEWS,

Sir:-This forenoon, while Governor Young was in our store, a large black man, whom nei ther of us knew, came in and after awhile asked the Governor why the mail could not start for the east.

The Governor replied that he knew nothing about the matter, and refered him to the postmaster for information, at the same time asking him if he had charge of the mail, and the reply was in the "AFFIRMATIVE."

The animals designed to take the mail out with had been attached, and the black man (a servant of Mr. Hockaday's, the mail agent here, as I afterwards learned) may have considered himself the representative of this agency, and had no better understanding than to speak to the Governor about an affair with which his Excellency had JOHN NEEDHAM. nothing to do.

The Mail for the East was taken from the Post Office on the 2nd inst., at 5 p.m.

SAN FRANCISCO AND SAN BERNARDINO .- BY letters from Elders Parley P. Pratt and Amasa Lyman, of May 18, and June 1 and 6, to Prest. B. Young, we learn that Elder Pratt and the Elders and Saints generally were in good health. Elders McBride, C. W. West, N. Tanner, Wm. Farrer, R. N. Allred, and a company of 50 persons started, April 30, from San Juan for San Bernardino and this city. The Press and paper sold, and many small tracts and works had been distributed. On the morning of May 30, a block of 40 buildings was burnt in San Francisco; value not stated. 'Want of money, want of employ, want of market, and every kind of trouble seems to DEVILTRY itself." Br. Pratt intends to start home in June or July; his health was good, and he continually enjoyed the blessings of the Lord.

[To Elder G. A. Smith, from his brother John L. Smith.] DEVIL'S GATE FORT, OR FORT SEMINO, (330 miles from G. S. L. City,) Nebraska Territory, May 22, 1855.

I am gaining my strength, but am still lame and scarcely able to get out and in the wagons alone. We arrived here about 4 p.m., and stopped to shoe some of our horses .-We have had some very high, cold winds, and two or three rain storms, and one snow storm. The ferryman at Green River, Bro. Frank Woodard, would not take any pay for crossing us over; he crossed 8 wagons in

The health of the camp is generally good: bro. Kay's and with that promptness which will merit a good share health is improving, and all feel first rate We have our prayers morning and evening. Our teams have improved as a general thing, or at least they have held their own .-We have traveled at the rate of 21 miles penday since we left home. We have 19 men in camp, and overtook ? more here who wish to join us. The Indians stole all the horses from this station, 86 in number. We guard ours closely every night. The Indians are now camped on the Platte in large numbers; but we feel to trust in the Adley Stephen Lord and do right. Give my respects to Prests. Young, Kimball and Grant.

> FORT SEMINO, May 23, 1855.

I wish to make through the 'News,' honorable mention of the kindness of Mr. Semino to the missionaries who arrived here yesterday evening. He kindly invited us into his rooms, built excellent fires, and told us to make ourselves at home. He has an excellent fort built on three Babcock Mr sides of a square, containing ten large rooms; it is situated about three quarters of a mile south of the Devil's Gate, and has a good horse caral on the east side; also a Pall Daniel cattle yard, and is in decidedly the handsomest situation, and best built of any I have seen in the mountains, and is clean and neat. He has a small store containing grocer ies, Indian goods, and supplies for Traders and Emigrants generally. We think one reason of his prosperity is that he keeps no liquor.

The Sioux Indians during the past spring have stolen Barker Polly from this Fort and mighborhood, about ninety horses, leaving the men here all on foot. We learn that the Ogslal- Ja .. John lah band of Sloux Indians are congregated, and are stil, gathering, at Upper Platte bridge, intending to steal all the horses they can lay their hands on.

We shall start in about half an hour, probably camp at Willow springs to-night, and if prospered, to-morrow night with the Sioux. It has been a dry, cold spring, waters low, and feed poor. Grasshoppers were plenty till we arhad arrived to Bro. Pratt's care. A few hundred rived at the South Pass. We measured an ox this morning, dollars worth of 'Mormon' publications had been poor at that, girth nine feet seven inches and a half, length the same. Please tell this to bishop Hunter. Give our respects to the Presidency and Saints. As ever, I remain

B. Thurston, W. King, and Childe Mr Joseph A. Peck. I have been greatly blessed since I left home both with Davis TP health, means, and a most excellent appetite. I can eat Days John almost anything that a native can, and am growing quite fleshy. My progress in the language of this people seems | Eastman Osro somewhat tardy, but still I have faith that, by the grace and assistance of the Spirit of the Lord, I will be able to learn it after a while.

It seems that there is great need of our learning fast, for the work will soon fall into the hands of Ferguson Jacob young elders, as the others are leaving for home.

The brethren are getting along well on the island of Foos Allen A Lanai, and have been blessed with a plentiful barvest the past season. Brother F. A. Hammond and other brethren have purchased a sinall schooner, for which they are to pay \$1800; it is to be used in gathering the Saints, and Galloway Amasa in shipping their produce to market. The work seems to be going forward, but not without some opposition.
