

REPRESENTATIONS MADE TO FRANCE

By Japan Regarding Presence of Russian Pacific Squadron in Kamranh Bay.

EXACT TERMS NOT DISCLOSED.

It is Maintained that the Size of the Bay Permits Ships to Enter Without Being in French Waters.

Paris, April 20.—Acting on instructions from his government, Dr. Motono, the Japanese minister to France, called on Foreign Minister Delcasse this evening and submitted representations on behalf of Japan concerning the presence of the Russian Pacific squadron in Kamranh bay. An official communication issued after the meeting states that Minister Motono's action had not the character of a formal protest against an alleged violation of neutrality, but was to obtain assurances that France would observe strict neutrality.

Notwithstanding the official version, it is evident that the intention and effect of Dr. Motono's mission is in the nature of a protest. Foreign Minister Delcasse responded to the representations of the Japanese minister by pointing out the precaution that had been taken to preserve neutrality, and the government's instructions recently sent to the governor-general of Indo-China, urging continued care to preserve neutrality.

The exact terms of Japan's representations have not been disclosed, but it is understood that, while having the usual courteous form of diplomacy, they set forth that serious apprehensions had been aroused by the stay of the Russian warships in Kamranh bay and the earnest desire that French neutrality be placed beyond doubt.

Dr. Motono, minister of Japan, has taken steps to call the attention of the minister of foreign affairs to the reported presence of Russian vessels in Kamranh bay. At the ministry of foreign affairs it is said that Minister Motono's action does not take the character of a formal protest against alleged violation of neutrality by France relative to the Russian fleet. The Japanese particularly desired to obtain from the French government, as had been done when the Baltic squadron passed through the more narrow straits of the Russian fleet.

The French government has on frequent occasions pointedly affirmed that all precautions have been taken for the observance of neutrality. Special instructions have been forwarded to Indo-China on the subject. The minister of foreign affairs is, therefore, able to allay the uneasiness Japan has manifested, which has not been justified up to the present by any specific act.

sky has not overstepped the French rule of neutrality at Kamranh bay, the coaling and provisioning of his ships occurring outside territorial waters. Russia has not been advised that Japan had lodged a protest in Paris. The charges of Russia's violation of neutrality, coupled with the revival of the story that Russia intends to send her Black Sea fleet through the Dardanelles, and the report that the British Mediterranean fleet has been sent to the Aegean sea to had off the Russian fleet, cause extreme irritation.

Nothing to Cause Alarm. London, April 20.—Notwithstanding emphatic protests of some of the newspaper and shrieks of indignation from the jingo press, British government officials decline to admit that there is anything in the far eastern situation to cause excitement or to show that it approaches an acute stage. In other words, the foreign office assumes the attitude of a much interested spectator of an intensely dramatic situation, which is approaching a climax in which by some chance Great Britain might be called on to play a part.

The announcement in the Paris dispatches to the Associated Press that Dr. Motono, the Japanese minister there, has called on Foreign Minister Delcasse with regard to the question of neutrality, has not changed the views of officials at the foreign office where it was pointed out today that Japan probably had not made a formal protest, but simply desired assurances that France will continue to maintain neutrality and not afford the Russians any advantage inconsistent with France's responsibilities as a neutral. The foreign office assumes that France most certainly will give some assurance to Japan.

The foreign office stated to the Associated Press that it was not at all unlikely that Great Britain would be required to take action in support of any protest. The attitude of the foreign office is that there is not as yet any proof that a violation of neutrality has occurred, and it prefers to think that France is preserving neutrality according to her own interpretation and that Russia would not wilfully involve her in a charge of actual violation of neutrality at Kamranh bay.

RUSSIAN RED CROSS FUNDS. St. Petersburg, April 20.—S. S. Alexandrovsky, head of the Red Cross in the field, arrived here today. He indignantly denied the charges of misappropriation of Red Cross funds, and announces that he is preparing a complete account for the public.

RUSSIA ORDERS CARTRIDGES. St. Petersburg, April 21.—The government is placing orders abroad for 400,000,000 cartridges, and is also inquiring for ironclads of from 15,000 to 20,000 tons. It is persistently reported that Russia has bought several South American warships through Paris intermediaries.

Schwab After Russian Contracts. St. Petersburg, April 21, 2:15 a. m.—Charles M. Schwab of the Bethlehem Steel works, will arrive in St. Petersburg on Saturday to confer with the

admiralty and with the minister of finance regarding the Russian naval program which it is said now practically completed, although it has not reached final imperial approval. It is said that some preliminary negotiations relative to the building of a ship in the United States and involving the possible construction of the big ship yards in Russia have already taken place and that Mr. Schwab is coming here upon the request of the Russian government to discuss the subject in detail.

PROGRAM OF RUSSIAN NAT'L PROGRESSIVE PARTY.

St. Petersburg, April 20.—The Progressive National party, headed by M. Shipoff and Prince Troubelsky, which seceded from the Radical Liberals who announced themselves in favor of a democratic constitution, has published a program which contemplates the creation of a permanent representative advisory institution not elected by direct suffrage, but by the zemstvos and doumas throughout the empire. The proposed organization is to be vested with power to propose new laws, the modification of old laws, discuss the budget and interrogate ministers. The ministers, however, are to be responsible not to the representative institution, but to the emperor. The president of the institution, who would be empowered to transmit its recommendations to his majesty, is to be chosen by the emperor from nominations submitted by the institution.

The program carries with it a proposition for the reorganization and extension of the zemstvos system to all non-Russian as well as to the Russian provinces. Owing to the prominence of the leaders of this party, who formerly were in close alliance with the Liberals, the middle position they have taken against the creation of a legislative body clothed with full powers on the ground that neither Russia nor the people are ready for a parliament based on universal suffrage, is likely to attract the support of all the moderates.

IRAN KALEIFF TO BE HANGED NEXT WEEK. Moscow, April 20.—Ivan Kaleiff, who killed Grand Duke Sergius and was sentenced to death, will be hanged next week. His brother is a member of a guard regiment stationed at St. Petersburg. His mother belongs to a noble Polish family and is married beneath her station to a Russian police sergeant of Warsaw, now deceased.

VIENNA AND VATICAN. Later Withdraws Opposition to Visits by Hapsburg to Quirinal. Vienna, April 20.—A report was received here tonight from Trieste to the effect that the vatican had decided to withdraw its long standing opposition to any member of the house of Hapsburg making official visits to the Italian royal family at Rome without first visiting the vatican.

GERMAN-AMERICAN TRADE. It is Adversely Affected by the Tariff. Berlin, April 20.—The chamber of commerce of Frankfurt-am-Main has sent to Chancellor von Bülow a memorial on German-American trade relations, containing many examples, drawn from the chamber's territory, showing the unprofitable workings of the present tariff. The memorial states that the chamber desires a long-term treaty with the United States, "but is unable to suggest any definite working of the United States at this time will not meet for slight reductions the entire benefits of our treaty rates, and that the United States will not collect heavier duties on the same articles than Germany does."

WANTS AN ACCOUNTING. J. P. Foss Asks One of Chicago People's Gas Light & Coke Co. Chicago, April 20.—John P. Foss, a retired merchant, 60 years of age, has filed a bill in the circuit court demanding an accounting with the People's Gas Light & Coke company and asking that the affairs of the company be placed in the hands of a receiver pending conclusion of the suit he has brought against it. Foss is searching through an old safe a short time ago found three forgotten stock certificates in the original People's Gas company of the original face value of \$75,000. The certificates are of the first stock issue of the company, when its capital stock was only \$500,000. The stock of the company is now \$35,000,000 and Foss claims that he is entitled to such a proportion of the present capitalization as his \$75,000 worth of stock bore toward the capital stock of the company at the time of its issue.

MOYER'S SUIT. Atty.-Gen. Miller of Colorado Asks that it be Dismissed. Denver, Colo., April 20.—Atty.-Gen. Miller today filed a motion in the United States court asking that the suit of Charles Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, against former Gov. Peabody, former Adj.-Gen. Bell and former Capt. Wells (now adjutant general), be dismissed. The suit is for \$100,000 damages for Moyer's detention in the bull pen at Telluride during the strike. The motion attacks the complaint, and further states that no federal question is involved and, therefore, the court has no jurisdiction.

JOHN EHLE'S DEATH. Coroner's Jury Found He Had Been Murdered. Great Falls, Mont., April 20.—A special inquest at Great Falls, Mont., today found that a coroner's jury which investigated the death of John Ehler, found that the man had been murdered and that his body had been thrown into the river. The bones of the head were found to be broken in many places. The bones of the neck were

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completely severed from the skull. The jaws were broken in several places also the nose, the only whole places being on top of the head. Instead of being shot as was first reported, the murderer used some heavy blunt instrument. About \$25 were found in Ehler's pocket so the motive could not have been robbery.

ROMESTAD ENTRIES. Circular Sent Out Telling How To Perfect Them. Washington, April 20.—Commissioner Richards of the general land office has prepared a circular to be sent to entrymen under the homestead law giving them minute instructions as to how to proceed under the law to perfect their claims. This never before has been done and the ignorance of the homesteaders and of their attorneys has caused much confusion.

LETTER FROM BRADY. He Explains but Does Not Resign. Washington, April 20.—Secy. Hitchcock has received from Gov. Brady of Alaska a letter in response to his request for an explanation of his connection with a mining development enterprise which has been extensively advertised. The governor defended his company as entirely legitimate, but does not manifest a disposition to resign, either as governor or as director of the mining company. Action will be postponed until the return of the president.

Leadville Smelter Strike Settled. Leadville, Colo., April 20.—The strike in the Arkansas Valley smelter, a property of the American Smelting & Refining company, was settled today. Four furnaces were blown in and 250 men returned to work. The two other furnaces will be started again as soon as they are ready.
