A correspondent at St. Petersburg says: The situation is decidedly pacific. In official circles it is be pacific. In official circles it is be lieved that Germany's mediation will very likely be successful, and that the Congress will soon assem-ble. It will probably be preceded by a preliminary conference of am-basendors at Berlin, which is ex-pacted to decide that invitations to the Congress shall be insued to con-sider the modifications necessary in the treaties of 1856 and 1871. It is confidently anticipated that some such formula will be accepted both in London and St. Petersburg. The meeting of the congress would dissipate many difficultier.
