**WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH OFFICE.**—The Western Union Telegraph Company have moved their office in this city, next door to the First National Bank, a much neater, more commodious and eligible situation, than the one formerly occupied. They have also extended their lines to New Mexico.

**TOOELE.**—Messrs. Warburton and Atkin, residents of Tooele City, called in this morning, in reference to the item in yesterday's News about the small pox in their burgh. They assured us that the letter referred to conveyed a misunderstanding, and that instead of several citizens being afflicted, the disease is confined to one family, and that every precaution has been taken by the authorities. The house where the disease exists is three-quarters of a mile from the city; it is strictly guarded, and no personal communication whatever allowed between its inmates and any who have not had the disease. Every want of the family is supplied by the city authorities.

We are glad to be able to make this report of Tooele in order to correct any false impression that might have been otherwise created; it also speaks well for the vigilance of the authorities of the city, who have done all that is possible to do, and there is no probability of the disease spreading.

This is as it should be in every place where contagious diseases exist.

**MAILING EXTRAORDINARY!**—Mr. Hauer, an employe in the Postoffice of this city, brought up to this office this morning some mail matter in a truly extraordinary condition. It consisted of packages of the DESERET NEWS and also letter mail, which was sent on its destination from the Postoffice here a week yesterday, and arrived at this Postoffice again last evening. There were two sacks, one of which was tagged for Fillmore, the other for Tokerville, neither of which should be opened until reaching the places to which they were addressed. Neither sack had been opened, but the condition of the contents it would be difficult to account for: The wrappers were torn, worn, dirty and wet, as though the packages had been months on the way, had had a dip in the creek, and been made a foot ball of, and as if everything that mischief could devise, short of opening the sacks, had been done to damage their contents. There was no means of telling how far these sacks had been towards their destination or the offices, for offense to certainly is, might be fastened where it deserves. Wanton mischief seems to have been the cause of the damage thus caused; but if its perpetrator could be discovered he might find himself withering and decaying the mails a serious thing. We hope, if it be the result of neglect or mischief, that the party will be discovered and punished.

**HEBER CITY, WASATCH CO.**—Bishop Abraham Hatch, of Heber City, called in to-day and gave a short account of matters and things in his field of labor. Those pests, the hoppers, destroyed most of the grain this season, but good crops of peas and potatoes are being raised, and the prospect for the future is good, for the hoppers are not laying eggs in the valley this fall. Sufficient hay will also be secured to feed the stock. The health and spirits of the people are first-rate, and having little or no harvesting to attend to, they are giving their time to the erection of houses, barns, fences, etc., and improvements are going on in all parts of the valley.

About two weeks since a band of Indians from the White Mountains, Colorado, made a raid on Midway, and succeeded in driving off some twelve or fifteen head of horses. A party went in pursuit. When they reached the Utah Reservation a portion returned home, the Chis. Tabby furnished a guide to the remainder, who continued the pursuit. They have not yet been heard from, but from what was learned at Utah, those who returned home feel sanguine that the stolen stock will be recovered.

**LLOYD'S WAR MAP.**—We have received a copy of Lloyd's war map of Europe, published by F. Lloyd, 30 Cortlandt street, New York. It is a large and very full map of that continent, printed on good paper, and is sold at fifty cents, or mounted and varnished \$1.25. It is unquestionably the most complete map of Europe yet published, and exhibits every place of the least note or importance from Lands' End in the British Islands to Egypt, and from the Mediterranean to the Baltic. On this map, prominently portrayed, are the present battle fields of the French and Prussian armies; also Suez, Egypt, the Crimea, Luxembourg, Waterloo, Valencia, and in fact every place of importance in all the various nationalities of Europe. To all interested in the contest now raging this map is of special value, by its aid the war dispatches may be read intelligibly, and it would be difficult, if not impossible, for fifty cents to be expended, so as to ensure its possessor a larger fund of useful information than by purchasing Lloyd's war map of Europe.

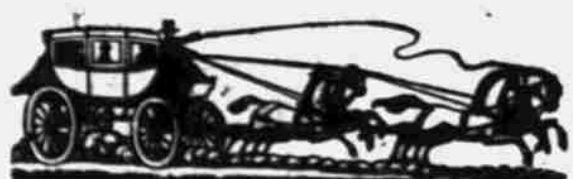
