LOCAL BRIEFS.

Nelson Leaves For Convention.—A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of education, left yesterday for Guthrie, Okla., to attend the convention of the National Association of Country Life as a delegate from Utah. Professor Lewis A. Merrill, the other delegate, was unable to go.

Death of Mrs. W. F. Laughlin.—Mrs. W. F. Laughlin, wife of an Associated Press reporter, died last night at Holy Cross hospital from the effects of an operation for tumor at the age of 24. Mrs. Laughlin was a native of Ohio, but spent most of her life in Salt Lake, and was for two years a student at the Salt Lake High school. The funeral will be held from the Sperry residence, 726 East Third street, tomorrow at 3 p. m.

HOSKIN NOT BADLY HURT.

Colorado Professor Injured in Railroad Collision Recovering.

Arthur Hoskin, professor of mineralogy in the Colorado school of mines, who was injured in a collision at Grand Junction yesterday afternoon, was brought to Salt Lake and placed in St. Mark's hospital. The accident occurred during the switching of a train which crashed into the coaches which Prof. Hoskin and a party of students of the Colorado school of mines were occupying on a visit to the mines of Utah and Montana. The cars conveying the party were standing on a side track without an engine when the collision occurred, and Prof. Hoskin was the only occupant of the forward tourist sleeper at the time.

Reports from the hospital today state that Prof. Hoskin's injuries are not serious, and that he will soon recover from the shock of the collision.

REAR END COLLISION ALARMS PASSENGERS

Accident at Sixth West and Second South Streets Injures Several Persons.

In a rear-end collision occurring between a Jordan bridge car, city bound, and a depot car yesterday afternoon about 6 o'clock, at the intersection of Sixth West and Second South streets, Motorman Charles Gammon and several passengers were severely injured. Among the passengers hurt were Mrs. F. W. Proby of 723 West Temple street, and Mrs. J. A. Stephens of Sixth West and South Temple streets. None of the injuries was of a dangerous nature, however.

The accident was caused by an open switch. The Jordan bridge car, city bound, had swung around the curve at Sixth West and Second South and stopped beyond the curve. The depot car was following immediately behind and as it struck the switch instead of taking the straight track east it swung on to the curve and plunged into the rear of the Jordan bridge car. Motorman Gammon could not set the emergency brakes.

Motorman Gammon was thrown to one side of the vestibule and sustained severe bruises about the head and shoulders. Mrs. Stephens and Mrs. Proby were occupying rear seats in the Jordan bridge car, and were badly bruised and shaken up by being thrown against the forward seats. Other passengers in the depot car received slight injuries from the jar of the collision.

Both cars were badly damaged and had to be hauled to the car barns.
