TALK OF THE TOWN.

Some sports at Black Rock this evening.

A few light clouds are sailing through the beautiful blue.

The Third District Court adjourned yesterday until the 15th inst.

Elder C. W. Staines is still alive, but there is absolutely no hope of his recovery.

The mercury stands at 93 in the shade, and it is not the only thing that stands in the shade today.

Hon. Wm. Jennings and T. G. Webber, Esq., who went to Logan on Sunday afternoon last, returned to town yesterday.

The Tenth Ward Brass Band excursion left for Cache Valley this morning. Quite a large number availed themselves of the trip.

The corner stone of the new Opera House will be laid tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. A number of fraternal organizations will take part in the proceedings.

The 14th Ward Sunday School went to Calder's Farm today—a jolly time expected. Notwithstanding the hot weather, a gentleman says he saw one Freeze on the way down.

While the death rate in Salt Lake City for the last month is exceedingly high, Ogden is said to be remarkably healthy, there being but little sickness and the number of deaths very light.

Captain Andrew Bart, City Marshal, has lost a red mink coat, and would feel obliged to somebody who would kindly "arrest" it and send it home to the owner. The party if doing will be rewarded for his trouble.

Quite a large party of ladies and gentlemen left for the Big Cottonwoods this morning. Some narrow escapes from being scalped, thrilling adventures with rattlesnakes, and bears, and other harmless animals, will be in order soon.

The proprietors of several houses of ill fame, together with a number of the inmates of the same, were arrested yesterday. Subsequently they were brought before Judge Pyper, when fine were inflicted amounting in the aggregate to \$1,005.

The Wood River Stage Robbery.—About ten days ago we published the fact that the Kelton and Wood River stage was robbed, near South's Rest, on the Boise road. The robbers secured \$800 in gold coin. The Wood River News of July 30th, states that the supposed robber was arrested at Bellevue and lodged in jail. On his person was found \$580 in coin. Circumstantial evidence is very strong against him.

Bear Lake Items.—President Rich has not been so well of late, but he still takes his daily drives in the open air.

The haying season has fairly set in, with the heaviest crop of hay we ever had in this valley.

The coming month will be a critical one for Bear Lake crops. If they get through it without a hard freeze we will raise enough to sustain us.

Death of the President of the Scandinavian Mission.—A cablegram from President Carrington, of Liverpool, received to-day, conveys the melancholy intelligence of the death, on the 1st inst., of Elder Niels Wilhelmson, President of the Scandinavian mission. Deceased was the son of Wilhelm Christiansson and Elise Nielsen, and was born April 21, 1824, at Fensling, Skanderborg, Denmark. He was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, August 30, 1854, by Frederic Philetas. Brother Wilhelmson held the office of a High Priest. He resided at St. Charles, Bear Lake Co., Idaho, and was set apart to the Scandinavian Mission, by President John Taylor, July 28, 1879. At present we are without information as to the immediate cause of Brother Wilhelmson's death. He was a good and useful man. His family and friends, however, have our deepest sympathy and condolence in the loss they are called upon to sustain.

Identified.—The body found a little to the west of West Jordan, as reported in our impression of last evening, has been identified as that of Louis F. Alpey, a miner and prospector, who came to Utah from California about twelve years ago. Some time since deceased had a stroke of paralysis, and had been under the care of the Salt Lake County for nearly two years, living on the poor farm in the Nineteenth Ward. Occasionally he would come into town to see his friends, and seemed to have an impression that he had some mining claims in Deep Creek. He was last seen alive on Thursday evening, having called at the farm of Wm. Barton Snarr, South Cottonwood, and was very desirous that Mrs. Snarr should lend him a horse with which to go out and visit his claims. Of course his desire in this respect was not granted, and refusing to stay all night at the farm he wandered away and was ultimately found dead on the prairie about five miles west of West Jordan.

"Professor Hartz."—The successful manner in which this bill swindled the Salt Lake public continues to be the talk of the street. Although his "entertainment" (?) was not advertised in any of the papers, yet the "Professor" took care to let the public know of his intended appearance. For several days he had about a score of boys delivering bills in every Ward in the city, and on the enormous crush at the Theatre on Monday evening, the "gift" trick worked successfully. When the crush was at its height, several women, ignorant at the swindle, rushed over to Mr. Hartz's and purchased some eggs which were profusely thrown at the fellow who was dispensing the "valuables" in the ticket office. Altogether the scene was a lively one while it lasted, and it is to be hoped that "Hartz" and all of his kindred, will, in future, be given a wide berth in Salt Lake City.
