PICKPOCKETS MAKE BIG HAUL. Union Depot Platform Scene of Bold Robberies.

Ogden, Oct. 1.—The work of pickpockets at the Ogden Union depot is again becoming active; yesterday passengers were relieved of upwards of \$1,200 while waiting for trains, and the clever "touchers" are still at large. The victims of the robberies were John Wenzel, a wealthy musician; J. E. Langman, a mining expert of Goldfield, Nev., and a Japanese. Wenzel was the heaviest loser; from his pocket he lost two wallets containing \$200, Langman was touched for \$225, all of which was in Wells-Fargo money orders, excepting \$25 in gold, and as the money orders are made payable to him personally, they cannot be cashed unless someone forges his name and then he would not be the loser. The dep had his wallet taken, but it contained only a few papers of value to any one but himself. The robberies were perpetrated on the depot platform in the presence of many people, yet the robbers were so clever in their work that the police have been unable to get any trace of them.

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MUST SUPPORT MOTHER.

If John P. Anderson, now of Salt Lake City, and a resident of Ogden, do not at once make adequate provision during the next week for the support of their aged mother, they will be prosecuted by County Attorney Harris. An application for an allowance of \$10 per month for the old lady's support, the commissioners investigated the case and found that she has two grown children, one of whom is a support her, and therefore passed a resolution directing the county attorney to instruct the sons that they must support their mother or suffer the punishment for such neglect.

The commissioners have decided to commence the fencing of the Ogden canyon road in all dangerous places, next week.

PAYSON. NORMAN G. BRIMHALL DEAD.

Honored Veteran Closes Eventful Career at 87—Coal Situation Serious.

Special Correspondence. Payson, Utah Co., Sept. 2.—Norman G. Brimhall, one of our oldest residents, died yesterday in the county infirmary at Payson of old age and general debility. He was born in Springfield, Ill., November, 1820, and became identified with the latter-day saints' faith in early life and endured some of the persecutions incident to that faith. He came to Utah in his early settlement and resided in Payson for 25 years. His wife and daughter survive him scattered in different parts of the west. A large number of grandchildren and about 20 great-grandchildren, constitute his numerous posterity.
