

HEARST EMPLOYS STRIKE METHODS

Threatened to Retire From Race
Unless Republican Fusion Can-
didates Appeared With Him.

THREAT HAD DESIRED EFFECT

For First Time in His Life Judge
William Gaynor Entered
Tammany Hall

New York, Oct. 20.—William Randolph Hearst, nominee for mayor, has won a strike which he declared against the Republican fusion ticket, according to a story current here. Until last Saturday none of the nominees on the Republican fusion ticket had appeared with Mr. Hearst on his speech-making tour. As all of the nominees, with the exception of that for mayor, are also on the Hearst ticket, Mr. Hearst believed that they should speak with him during his energetic campaign.

Hearst was scheduled for a speech Saturday night, and three hours before the meeting was to be called he said to have served notice upon Republican fusion nominees that unless the nominees for comptroller and borough presidents appeared with him on the same platform, he would retire from the race for mayor and leave the Republican fusion ticket to fight Tammany alone.

This declaration is said to have thrown the Republican camp into confusion which lasted for two hours, as until fusion nominees assured Mr. Hearst that they would appear with him.

Mr. Hearst then called his short and successful strike off, and since then the fusion nominees have been working with him.

GAYNOR IN TAMMANY HALL.

"And so this is Tammany Hall? It is the first time that I ever have been here, but if this is Tammany Hall, where is the tiger?"

These were the first words spoken last night by William J. Gaynor, Democratic nominee for mayor, as he entered over a great audience in the old structure on Fourteenth street known as the Wigwag, the headquarters of the most remarkable political organization in the world. He was greeted with cheers.

It was a typical Tammany ovation and a typical Tammany ratification meeting. The hall was packed. Although Judge Gaynor had delivered several addresses since his nomination, it was not until tonight that the Democratic ticket in Manhattan was "officially ratified."

Otto T. Barnard, maintaining his whirlwind pace, but adhering closely to business issues made four speeches in Harlem tonight, but interest was centered in the Tammany gathering.

Judge Gaynor went over the ground that he has covered heretofore—thrusts at William R. Hearst, his Independent rival, and criticism of Barnard. He also touched on "personal liberty," traction problems, subways and other issues of interest to the city only. He repeated that if there was to be any swallowing between him and the tiger, he would be found on the outside. Re-

Referring to the office of mayor, he claimed it as second in importance only to the presidency of the United States, and said that no office offered greater opportunity for exercising power for good or evil.

He sought to refute the charge that he was strictly a Tammany candidate. While Gaynor was speaking, four big cut-of-door meetings were conducted from as many platforms to accommodate the great throng that could not get into Tammany Hall.

Fourteenth street, between Third avenue and Irving place to the west, was jammed, and the police had difficulty in keeping order. The splutter of fireworks and fire and torches added to the confusion, but no one was seriously injured.

Inside when Gaynor announced that he was bound by no party and to no man, his declaration was received with cheers. Charles A. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, was present, as were other prominent members of the organization.

Refusing to be drawn into any controversy with Hearst, who at first accepted the nomination as a passive candidate, he said that Monday night turned against the Republican nominee and attacked him bitterly. Mr. Barnard said: "I am not spending my time abusing other candidates, but instead I am touching on different phases of city life."

He refused absolutely to comment on Hearst's attack. Hearst rested last night. Gaynor is still the favorite in the betting, although money for election seems scarce this year, or else those who wager on the results of elections are holding off for the situation to clear up. At the Hoffman House, where many of the election wagers are posted, it was said that no prevailing odds have developed. There are wagers, however, \$2,000 to \$1,500, or four to three, that Barnard would be lost, and \$2,000 was bet against \$1,000 on Gaynor against the field.

NEW \$5 COUNTERFEIT.

New York, Oct. 20.—Secret service agents in this city have discovered that large quantities of a counterfeit \$5 bill are being made in Italy, and distributed in this country. The discovery was made in the conviction of two men in the federal court who were accused by a third man of selling him \$5 in coun-

terfeit for \$15 good money. The bill bears the portrait of President Jackson, and is numbered A2440113, of the series of 1907.

Duplicates of the counterfeit have appeared in half a dozen cities and a warning has been sent to all banks.

GIFTS TO HOSPITALS.

New York, Oct. 20.—The Presbyterian and the Hahnemann hospitals of this city, will each be about \$500,000 richer by the terms of the will of Mitchell Valentine, a money leader of Westchester village who died at the age of 85 years, leaving an estate conservatively estimated at \$2,000,000.

Aside from a few bequests to relatives and institutions, the fortune is to be divided equally between the two hospitals.

LOS ANGELES GOWING

BY ANNEXATION

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 20.—By a vote of 517 for to 95 against, Colegrove and the extensive territory just west of the city limits, decided to become a part of the city of Los Angeles.

Los Angeles sealed the bond by a vote of 5,782 for, to 319 against at an election. It is estimated that the annexed territory contains a population of 10,000, and its assessed valuation is \$12,000,000. It has an area of 18 square miles.

DECISION REGARDING

TELEGRAPH COMPANIES

Little Rock, Ark., Oct. 20.—The Arkansas supreme court yesterday ruled that telegraph companies must keep their operators informed as to which stations are operated day and night and which only at night.

The case decided is that of G. B. Harris against a telegraph company. Mrs. Harris came from Perryville to visit relatives here. She suddenly was taken ill and a night service message to her husband at Perryville was accepted by the agent here for immediate delivery. It developed that the company maintained no night agent at Perryville. Mrs. Harris was unable to recognize her husband so near death as she when he arrived. The court holds the company liable to judgment for damages.

TELLS WIVES HOW TO

MANAGE THEIR HUSBANDS

Chicago, Oct. 20.—Matrimonial mishaps and how to avoid them, was the text of an address delivered before the 35th association, a woman's club, by the Rev. D. D. Vaughan last night. About 200 young women listened to the discourse and went to their homes with some of the following epigrams to ponder over:

Marriage is the normal state, but it is no longer a necessary state. Women often marry for a home, or because they wish to show some other woman that they can marry that particular man.

Learn to understand your husbands—men are transparent.

Pretty girls are not in demand; neat girls are. To hold the love of your husbands keep fooling them. Make them believe you are the angel they supposed you were before the wedding ceremony.

Women should love their husbands more than their children or parents, otherwise they will not be ideally happy.

The minister's subject was "Matrimony," which he said he had been studying for over a year and upon which he felt competent to talk, inasmuch as he had circulated questions bearing on that subject to his congregation, and had received over 200 answers.

"The idea that a man can live cheaper after he has married than he did before is fallacious and misleading," said Mr. Vaughan. "That is possible only when the candidate for matrimonial honors has spent his income in riotous living. The single man who lives in thrift will find that when he gets married he will be called upon to spend three times as much for living expenses as he did before."
