Chicago, Feb. 24 .-- The train rules Chicago, Feb. 24.—The train rules committee of the American Railroad association has held a meeting here and completed a code of rules to gov-ern the operation of trains on roads having three and four tracks. The committee has been at work for months, and is ready to make recom-mendations to the general association at its next semi-annual meeting. Un-

at its next semi-annual meeting. Un-doubtedly the rules as prepared will be approved and adopted by all of the roads which are members of the organization.

The purpose of formulating a code is to obtain uniform practise on all im-portant American railroad systems. With uniformity it is said, in the rules

which understandly it is said, in the rules and methods of operation railroad ac-cidents will be greatly lessened. The new rules are said to be com-prehensive and include the operation of trains "against the current" of traffic under certain conditions. That is to say, that when the tracks are properly protected by block signals it will be permissable to switch a train onto the opposite track and there openccording to certain rules and regulations.
