

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRE.**—To-night, the Fall season will commence at the Theatre. The opening piece, by a gentleman connected with the press in San Francisco, has attained considerable celebrity in the theatrical world. **A CURIOUS FINISH TO A RUN-AWAY.**—Yesterday afternoon a span of horses, hitched to a wagon standing near Col. Little's Co-operative Wagon Manufacturing, started off at a furious rate. The tongue of the wagon, by some means, got loose and dropped, and after a smart run the "critters" were brought to a sudden standstill, and damaged and accident probably prevented, by leaving the wagon tongue to a depth of several inches into the trunk of one of the shade trees by the side of the creek. The owner of the wagon had to chop part of the tree away in order to liberate the tongue. It being so firmly embedded in the trunk of the tree that it was found impossible to extricate it in any other way.

**ARRIVAL AT LIVERPOOL.**—By a letter from Elder John Jacques, who left this city a short time since for Liverpool, we learn that he arrived off Quostown, Ireland, on the evening of Wednesday the 11th ult., and reached Liverpool at 3 o'clock on the Friday morning following. He found President Carrington well. Bro. Jacques crossed the ocean in the steamship Virginia, and had a very pleasant journey, reaching the end of his journey in excellent health, in 12 days and 10 1/2 hours.

**BEAR LAKE COMING UP.**—We had a fine specimen of turnips, three in number, left here this morning, from St. Charles, Rich County, Bear Lake Valley. They were raised on land occupied by Bro. Pearce of that city, and though only about half-grown, weighed eleven and a half pounds. Also a specimen of Sonora wheat grown by Bro. Pearce of the same place, of most excellent quality. The citizens of St. Charles and vicinity estimate their crop this season at twenty thousand bushels. This is good news from Bear Lake; and after the repeated disappointments of the settlers in that valley, it must be especially cheering. The obedient will be blessed and obtain their reward; it is as inevitable as the rising and setting of the sun.

**OUR WESTERN BOUNDARY.**—The Omaha Herald of the 31st ult., contains the following:

"Mr. D. Van Etten, of this city, has been selected to survey the boundary line between the State of Nevada and the Territory of Utah, and if certain stipulations which he has made be approved, he will accept the position and commence operations as soon as his partner, Mr. Bradburn, returns from his surveying tour, making the southern portion of the line during the winter."

"The importance of this survey results from the fact that a great portion of the country through which the line passes has been almost wholly unexplored, making the party not only a surveying, but an exploring party, including topographical surveys, astronomical, barometrical, geological and mineralogical observations, and climatology. These distinctive qualifications as well as his great engineering ability makes the selection of Mr. Van Etten a very happy one."
