EASTERN ITEMS.

Maryland is now a free state, made so by the vote of the people. Gov. Bradford, in his proclamation of 29th Oct., states the ballot for and against the new constitution to have been as follows: 80,174 in favor of the change, and 29,799 against it.

The provision against slavery is in the following words:

Article 24.—That hereafter in this State, there shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except in punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted; and all persons held to service or labor as slaves are hereby declared free.

NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR.

The Newfoundland papers say that the cod-fishery has proved a failure this season. The shore voyages are over, resulting in the smallest catch on record, and news from Labrador shows that the catch there is far below the average. The herring fishery at Labrador is also a complete failure, the catch being very inconsiderable. The exports look larger this year than last, but the greater part has been old fish.

The St. Louis Republican states that three companies of the 11th Missouri regiment, mutinied at Washington in that State, and demanded to be sent to their homes in St. Louis. Col. Stone, the officer commanding, had no force with which to compel obedience and accordingly put them aboard of a train with the ostensible purpose of sending them home; He telegraphed the facts ahead, however, and at Franklin they were all arrested and put under guard. The mutineers number 120 men.

John Rantz, Samuel Kline and William Appleman, convicted of a conspiracy to resist the draft in Columbia county, Pennsylvania, have been sentenced as follows: Rantz, the ring-leader, to imprisonment in Fort Mifflin for two years and a fine of one thousand dollars; Kline to two years' imprisonment, and Appleman to a fine of five hundred dollars and one year's imprisonment. General Couch has confirmed the decision of the Military Court.

Several Catholic clergymen having been drafted in St. Louis, Mo., Father De Smet applied to the War Department for their exemption, on the ground that their principles as a religious order forbid them from bearing arms, that their houses of worship had hardly the necessary number of persons to keep them up; that their establishments were all in debt by the constructions of buildings for churches, schools, etc. In answer to this appeal, Provost Marshal General Fry ordered the ministers in question to be released on parole.

MULLER, convicted of murdering a Mr. Briggs in an English railway carriage, was sentenced to be hung on the 14th of Nov. last.

THE London Rothschilds have contracted to supply the Bank of France with two millions sterling in gold.
