Before that event they were pushing their preparations for war with commendable celerity. Since that, although their prepara-tions for war continue, they are presecuting them with great delib-eration. Whether they will here-

after accelerate or retard them will depend wholly upon the result of the next heavy battle between the Russians and Turks. The Servians are also very much less hurried than immediately after Gourko crossed the Balkans. It seems quite certain that if the Turks do not beat the Russians within the next beat the Russians within the next week or ten days their opportunity will have passed. At the end of that time the Russians will have received their reinforcements, and will be ready, if ever, to crush out their opponents.
