WEATHER CONDITIONS. The severe storm along the coast has interfered with telegraphic communication and no reports from stations west of the longitude of Salt Lake City have been received this morning. The map shows the storm center to be central over British Columbia. The only precipitation reported is from Minnesota and Oklahoma. It is warmer over Montana, Wyoming, Utah, eastern Colorado and Kansas. At Salt Lake City the temperature reached 46 degrees during the night, the highest recorded since the 6th instant.

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NEW ENTERPRISE STARTED

New Light, Heat and Power Company Files Its Articles.

Capitalization is Placed at \$24,000. With Shares at \$100 Each.

The new Light, Heat and Power company has filed its articles of incorporation with the county clerk. The capitalization is placed at \$24,000, in shares of \$100 each. M. H. Clark is president; W. A. Nelson, vice president; L. H. Furness, secretary and treasurer, and the other directors and shareholders are F. J. Cannon and E. F. Colborn. Salt Lake City is to be the company's principal place of business.

As stated in the articles of incorporation, the business and pursuit of the company is to manufacture and sell new light, heat and power, and to build plants for the production of electricity and for the production of light and power in all parts of the United States, using the patent rights acquired from the inventor.

The promoters believe there are great possibilities in the new discovery. They are not yet prepared to give out the details of the invention, but they state that it will revolutionize methods of lighting and heating, particularly the process is the extraction of gas for lighting and heating from coal oil, and the promoters say that in point of economy and quality of light, heat and power, the new light, heat and power company is already in the office and are ready to be inaugurated. The recorders will announce his other appointments in a few days.
