CLUB CHAT.

The action of the American Federation of Nurses in withdrawing from membership in the National Council of Women has been widely commented upon. The action was taken during the first annual convention of the organization as a body, held in Washington recently. The president, Mrs. M. A. Nutting of Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, president of the federation, read a paper written by Miss L. L. Dock, American honorary secretary of the International Council of Nurses, the essence of which was contained in the following:

As to whether we can carry membership in the International Council of Women is a question. It must be admitted that the National Council of Women in the United States is not as effective as those of other countries. I am also surprised to find how disproportionately high are its dues. Out of dues in this organization are more than six times as much as those of similar German and English associations—everything in America is expensive, but not six times as much.

It is also true that the Council of Women makes many demands upon the time and strength of our officers which these busy women are not able to meet. Neither do these seem of as much definite importance as their own nursing work. Time has not shown that we are of any real usefulness in the National Council, whereas we can be definitely helpful and useful in an international union of our own colleagues.

Personally I feel that this membership has been of great benefit to us in enabling us to come into relation with nurses of other countries, and in giving us a status in the great conference of women. If we could do everything I would gladly see our membership continued for this reason. But the impossibility of doing everything compels a choice sometimes, and if one has to be made, I feel that our Nurses' International association is much more important.

Resolutions were immediately introduced and voted that the federation withdraw its membership in the National Council of Women and that the federation affiliate with the International Council of Nurses. The federation adopted a constitution and appointed a committee to take action towards bringing about an affiliation of the training-schools for nurses throughout the country.

Former President Cleveland's philippic against "The Clubwoman" has drawn an answering shot from the very stronghold of the enemy. In the June number of Madame, Mrs. May Wright Sewall, honorary president of the International Council of Women and of the Council of Women of the United States, gives the side of the question of the wife who belongs to clubs and organizations.

The keynote of her reply is, that just as often the character of a woman must grow through cosmopolitan influences, so this she secures easiest and best in club life. Mrs. Sewall reasons that a woman is not entitled to mental development the same as her husband. She agrees with Mr. Cleveland in his opinion of the importance of without motherhood, but cannot see that a woman's existence should stop at that point.

The unwholesome results Mr. Cleveland attributes to woman clubs are denied by Mrs. Sewall, and in passing, she expresses a skepticism as to the former president's knowledge of such organizations. The club, according to Mrs. Sewall, is the best means of giving woman the broad unprovoked standpoint her nature seeks, and she concludes by necessity must be a clubwoman.

The entire blouse is simplicity itself in point of construction; but the exquisite sheerness of its materials, and the clever way the two embroideries are contrasted give it a cachet that no amount of elaboration could improve.
