### SENATOR LOGAN.

QUITE a number of people throughout the country seem to rejoice greatly now that Senator Logan of Illinois has been elected to stay at home. He appears to have full as many enemies as friends, and the former are as pungent in expressing their sentiments towards him as the latter are. The Omaha Herald, of Jan. 25 says—

"A political career that actually began with betrayal of the Union cause in 1861 has been blackened all over with political crime since. The head and front of the malignant policies that have prostrated and crushed the South in the Senate, John A. Logan has been one of the most embittered and unscrupulous men in the Grant phalanx. His recall to private life is one of the most gratifying signs of the coming redemption of the country. One by one the architects of the national ruin, the apologists of every public crime, and the authors of consuming corruption and waste, fade away from the public gaze into the obscurity from which they emerged. John A. Logan is a conspicuous figure in the procession, and may God have mercy on his black soul."

**A Good Book.**—We have received from Dwyer, by whom it is on sale, "The Student's Own Speaker," by Paul Reeves. It is one of the most sensible and therefore useful treatises on the oratorical art we have seen. Instead of binding the student down to the strict observance of rules and technicalities of

rhetoric, the author allows a wide scope for the characteristics and peculiarities of the individual. As a teacher of elocution his experience has taught him the necessity of pursuing that course, and he gives some happy examples of the correctness of his method, which he admits he was forced to adopt.

**Herriman.**—From Joseph J. Giles, of Herriman, West Jordan Ward, we have an account of the organization, at that place, by Elders W. S. Burton and Thomas E. Hull of this city, of a Y. M. M. I. A.

On the occasion the two brethren named made suitable remarks on the nature and objects of such societies, after which the organization was effected, by the election of the following officers—President, Thomas Butterfield, Jr.; Counselors, Franklin F. Carter and George Miller; Secretary, Joseph J. Giles; Treasurer, John Dansie. Thirty-four members were enrolled, with good prospects for future additions.

**Providence.**—Jas. Bullock writes from Providence, Cache County, Jan. 24, as follows—

"We have some good meetings here this winter, and the young men are commencing to study the Scriptures and learning to preach the gospel of the Kingdom of God, and we find that they are commencing to bear a faithful testimony to the truth of the latter-day work."

**Moan Copy Settlement.**—We have had the pleasure of perusing a letter from Sister Rebecca Taylor, now residing at the Moan Copy settlement, to her relatives in this city. It is dated January 14th, and breathes a very good spirit. We learn from it that there are now twelve large families there, and that on Christmas Day the sisters all clubbed together and made up a good dinner, in which all participated. In addition to the large stone house mentioned in former communications, seven other houses are nearly completed. A Sunday school has been organized, and also a choir, the latter being led by Sister Taylor. Meetings are held on Sundays, and also on Thursday evenings of each week, at which the people enjoy themselves greatly in speaking upon the great work of the Lord and of his goodness.

**The Arizona Settlements.**—We have seen a letter from Brother Franklin D. R. Gray, son of Brother John Gray, of this City. It was written at Allensville, on the Little Colorado, Jan. 17th. He corroborates statements heretofore made regarding the abundance of good timber in that region, and says further that the lumber made at the saw mill is of most excellent quality, being comparatively free from knots. Rock is not only in great abundance, but is of a quality that he has never seen surpassed; it lies in very convenient form, being in layers, with fillings of dirt between each, the slabs being from half an inch to six or seven inches thick, up to six feet wide and as long as desirable. The week previous to writing there had been a snow-storm, but the snow melted almost as rapidly as it fell. He expresses a belief that the settlements will be most excellent and desirable places in a short time, the extent of the facilities being very favorable for such a result.
