The Hopt Case. -- The Hopt murer case, which was appealed last reek to the Supreme Court of the United States, will come up before that tribunal during the October term, it may be in November or December, precedence being given to cases of this character on the docket of the court. The defendant's attorneys will not go to Washington, having already rendered about as much gratuitous service as they can afford to do. It is not likely therefore that any verbal argument will be made before the Supreme Court. The case will be submitted with a brief and a short written argument, and will then have to stand on its merits, as already discussed. The only matters to be considered are certain points of law, and whichever way the case is decided in its present condition, there is but little doubt as to the final result. If Hopt does not escape meanwhile, the attempt at which may well be apprehended and guarded against, it is more than probable that he will eventually expiate his crime as a murderer should.
