Survivor of a Gold-Hunting Party
Tells a Sad Story—Gold Hunt
from the Far North.

Butte, Wash., July 10.—Mr. Fleming of Butte, Wash., who arrived here last night from Fort Warden, Alaska, is the sole survivor of a party of seven who went to the Yukon gold fields in the summer of 1898. Mr. Fleming is now in a very bad way, suffering from fever, scurvy, pneumonia and dropsy. He has been in the hospital for several days, and is expected to die soon.

The party consisted of Mr. Fleming, Mr. Smith, Mr. Jones, Mr. Brown, Mr. White, Mr. Black and Mr. Green. They went to the Yukon in the summer of 1898, and spent several months there. They were all suffering from the same disease, and were expected to die soon.
