WIRED FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, 15.—It is under-

stood Secretary Folger has tendered

the position of Chief Clerk of the

Bureau of Engraving and Printing

to John W. Corning, of Geneva, N. Y.,

at one time sergeant-at-arms of the

Legislature of New York, and of

that he has virtually accepted the

appointment.

Secretary Folger is reported better

signs for the national monument to

be erected at Rome in honor of Vi-

ctor Emmanuel II., the monument to

include a bronze equestrian statue of

Victor Emmanuel. Plans may be

made from December 1st to Decem-

ber 15th, 1883. The commis-

sion will decide upon the design,

and the successful artist will be en-

abled to 10,000 francs as a prize, 50,000

francs additional to be divided by

the commission among the most

Mineville, N. Y., this morning, was

instantly killed.

"New York, 15.—The steamship

Granado, Capt. Schumacher, which

arrived to-day from Sagay, brought

nine shipwrecked seamen, who be-

longed to the Norwegian bark *Oro-*

oro, last February 9th on Island Hi-

maden, near the coast of Cuba. The

Oro was bound for Portland, Me.,

with a cargo of coal, and was com-

mmanded by Capt. C. Muller, who

having mistaken the light, brought

the ship ashore in the night, during

the night of February 9th, and a

heavy squall carried her out of her

course. She struck heavily on Hi-

maden Island, where she remained

fast. All attempt to float her proved

fruitless, and she went to pieces.

Evansville, Ind., 15.—Last night,

the *Enquirer* going up, collided with

the *Dock* coming down.

The boats struck in the boiler dock,

caught fire and burned to the

water's edge. All on board escaped.

Pittsburgh, Pa., 15.—The strike

for six weeks of wages of the help-

ants at the *Pittsburgh* Iron Com-

pany's works throws 250 men out

of employment. The proprietors

favor furnishing the mills to give

work to the unemployed.

Montreal, 15.—Fogarty Bros.,

shoe manufacturers, have failed;

liabilities \$15,000; assets half.

Philadelphia, 15.—The whole-

sale firm of *Fierman & Place*, having

failed to meet two drafts of \$5,000

each, placed their affairs in the

hands of trustees and asked an ex-

tension of time. The liabilities are

estimated at \$435,000, 60 per cent

of which is secured by whisky in stock.

Fierman says no trustees have

been appointed, but he will consent

to the appointment of an advisory

committee. He claims the firm's

surplus above liabilities are half a

million dollars, and he will be sur-

prised to pay every dollar owed by

them. They only want a little time.

The New York Sun, under date of

London, 15, has this: Every part of

Westminster Abbey, the Houses of

Parliament, the great structures of

public offices, the clubs and dwell-

ing houses, were violently shaken

to-night by a tremendous explosion.

At 9 p.m. precisely a great detona-

tion was heard, followed by a crash

falling from the top of the

building. A deliberate attempt had

been made to blow up parts of the

government offices, especially the

part occupied by Sir Charles Dilke

and the local government board in

Parliament Street, Downing Street,

Charles Street and St. James' Park.

The apartments in question front on

Charles Street, and are almost level

with the pavement. The walls are

of great thickness and of solid ma-

sonry, and the windows protected by

a massive stone balustrade. Oppo-

site, 50 yards away, is King Street

police station and the sanitary guards.

The Parliament Street front and

the local government board in

Parliament Street are dark and un-

derstandingly, which partly ex-

plains the extraordinary fact that

no lives were lost. The dynamite

was placed on a window sill inside

the balustrade, where the force when

burning would be concealed from

any one passing. The force of the

explosion was terrible. The great

stone balustrade was shattered, the

massive masonry reduced to frag-

ments, and the pavement shattered.

A wooden structure opposite was

blown into splinters, and a mass of

stone driven through the wall of the

house beyond it. Inside of the walls

there remained nothing but splin-

tered wood, broken plaster, walls

burst and shattered, and the scene

was one of destruction. The street

was completely covered with the

fragments of broken plate glass, blown

from the windows, and a mass of
