Killed. Easton, Pa., Sept. 17.—A Lehigh Val-by express train from Buffalo to New York was wretked early today near Pattenburg tunnel, in New Jersey, 18 miles from this city. A number of trainmen and passengers were injured, but none of the latter fatally. The train was running at high speed when the locomotive jumped the track and plung-ed into the modulain side, Engineer Herbert Godley was infured internally. Godley is the engineer who was run-ning the Black Diamond express last winter when it left the track on the Delaware river bridge between this city and Phillipsburg, N. J., and narrowly escaped going into the river, 70 feet be-low.

The police claim that "Wanda" planned to become a "walking bomb" and enter the head-quarters building in the middle of the day, when it is generally full of police, wearing the uniform of a gendurme offi-cer Haed with walls of guncotton and carrying powerful bombs.
