WORK ORDERED STOPPED. Contractor Moran Must Replace Cob-

ble Stones at His Own Expense.

A meeting of the board of public works was held yesterday in the office of Chairman Fred J. Leonard, at which Contractor P. J. Moran was instructed to restore the cobble stones removed from the intersection at Second South and East Temple streets. Moran has

the contract for repaying that inter-section along with others in the busi-ness district with asphalt and had torn up the stone blocks and was preparing to lay the concrete and asphalt

when ordered to stop. The board of public works claims that the work should be done under its supervision and that Moran had not received instructions from the board to begin work. The contractor will have to restore the stone at his own expense. Another reason why the work was ordered stopped was to allow the Utah Light & Railway com-pany time to lay its new heavy steel curves, frogs and switches. This can not be done until later in the season owing to the fact that the steel plants are very crowded and the company can not get the necessary steel now. The board decided yesterday to al-low the company until April 1, 1907, to complete the work of laying steel at the intersections, hence the repaying will have to be postponed until next year

J. W. Percival, the contractor who is laying the watermains ordered by the city, was instructed by the board to complete without further delay the extensions on Pitt street, Ninth South street to supply the new fire stations, and on Fourth East from Eighth to Ninth South streets.

## SALE OF UTAH SHEEP

#### Different Lots Arrive on Kansas City Market and Bring Good Figures.

Special Correspondence. Stock Yards, Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 27.-Cows had a bad week last week, closing 10 to 15 cents lower, and stockers and feeders also suffered a decline of 10 to 20 cents, but good killing steers sold steady to 10 cents higher, dry lot cattle at highest point of the season. The supply was liberal at 62,000 head, about right for this season, but run today is light for Monday, 12,000 head, and the demand is sufficient to make a strong market on all kinds. Indications favor smaller cattle runs this fall than last, which should benefit the market, as demand is fully up to the standard for the fall months, with the possible exception of stockers and feeders just This branch is sure to revive now, soon, but the country buyers are hold-ing back a little more than was expected of them. Some Colorados from the mountain districts are here today 1,227-pound steers selling at \$4.75, cows in the me shipment at \$3.65, \$3,15 and \$2.60.

Panhandle cows are selling at \$2.40 to \$2.75, veals 25 to 50 cents above a week ago, carloads today at \$6.75, mixed and heavy calves, \$4.09 to \$5.50, feeders \$3.50 to \$4.15, stockers \$2.85 to \$4.00, bulls \$2.00 to \$2.50.

Sheep receipts are not up to the requirements of either the demand for killing kinds or for stock and feeding stuff, and breeding stock is especially No Westerns have been reshort. ceived here since Tuesday, with the exception of 11 doubles of Utah sheep to-day, which is arriving late. Prices are a little higher than a week ago and on a firm basis, but no pronounced ad-vance from present figures is exvalue from present ingures is ex-pected. Medium native spring lambs sold al \$7.50 today, prime stuff would bring/\$7.55 or better, the last Utah wethers here sold at \$5.16, a string of wethern yearlings at \$5.50, breeding afters at \$3.00 to \$5.50. Orders are held are for many thousands of shear and ere for many thousands of sheep and ambs suitable for the country, with apparently little prospect of many of hem ever being filled. Packer buyers are unable to get near enough for their orders, and everything is in favor

of sliers at present. W. H. Grant of the firm of Grant & Ingersoll, Utah, who brought in today sight carloads of sheep, reports range feed in that part of the state as being rood. He says that more rain than usual has fallen there this season, which had the effect of keeping the grass growing on the mountain ranges where the sheep are grazed. "The ismbs will begin to move soon from that part of the state." said Mr. Grant. "The lamb crop was a fairly good one and they are fat enough to go to the packers or for feeders. But we are short on breeding ewes. The demand for them exceeds the supply. We can sell at home all the breeding ewes we have. They are the most profitable sheep in the herd. They will raise a amb and, besides, produce a fleece of wool that will sell out there for \$1.75."
