

DEWEY SAYS KEEP THE PHILIPPINES

His Hearty Approval of the American Course Three

VIEWS ON CHINESE AFFAIRS

Admiral is Thankful People Do Not Want Him for President—The Politicians Fought Him.

[Early Dispatches.]

New York, June 15.—The Herald's Washington correspondent sends a report of an interview with Admiral Dewey, in which he is represented as confessing that his presidential prospects are not good. He said:

"Some time ago the leaders, or those whom we have always regarded as the leaders, asked me if I would allow myself to be nominated for the presidency."

"After thinking this proposition over several weeks, I said 'Yes,' and accordingly announced that if the people wanted me to serve in that capacity I would gladly do so."

"But I thank God they do not appear to want me."

"In these days the people do not select the President. The choice is now made by a few political leaders who put their heads together and fix up their candidate before the convention assembles."

Admiral Dewey recalled that in former days it was customary for the candidate before a national convention to receive the next highest number of votes to the successful man to receive the nomination for Vice President and that meant success in the presidency if the party continued in power."

"This led the admiral to the question of whether he would accept the nomination for Vice President. He said some of the very best friends had urged him to make a formal announcement that he would not accept second place on the ticket with Mr. Bryan. This, he had declined to do on the ground that the admiral had not been tendered him."

Admiral Dewey is entirely familiar with the situation in China. When asked the direct question: "What is likely to be the outcome of the present complications in China?" the admiral shook his head as if uncertain about venturing an opinion.

"The situation in China," he said, "is a very serious one—very serious indeed. I can only see but one outcome as a result of the trouble now going on in China, and that is the adoption of the American policy in favor of open ports for American commerce on equal terms with all the other commercial powers of the world."

"It must come to that eventually, and it is fortunate that we are in a position to say to the nations of Europe: 'We are not in this deal, gentlemen. This would not have been possible,'"

"continued the admiral, "had it not been for the result of the Spanish war. It seems that God is in making it possible to have at the moment the largest army of men and the most formidable fleet of ships right on the spot to enforce our rights and see that American interests are protected."

"Not only have we an army of over 100,000 trained soldiers at the very gate of the Orient, but we are the only nation that has gunboats on the Yangtze-Kiang river. It seems like a special dispensation of providence for us to have two of our gunboats which are capable of navigating the river."

"Why," exclaimed the admiral, "in many parts of China the Chinese are taking American goods in preference to the goods of other nations, and we have the Philippines we are right at the very door of this rich field of commerce."

"When you sincerely believe in our position in the Philippines," the admiral was asked.

"Most assuredly, I do," was the reply. "Had it not been for our acquisition of these islands, it would not have been possible to have the fighting force in these waters today and we would have been ignored in the deliberations now being held by the representatives of the great nations of Europe relative to China, the same as we were of the smaller countries of South America."

"Not only am I interested in the subjugation of the Philippines, but I have a number of dear, warm personal friends actively engaged in the conflict. One of these is Vice Admiral Seymour, who is in personal command of the British fleet. I pray God they are not going to massacre him. He was with me when I saw Aguinaldo, and Seymour advised the Philippine chief to tie to the Americans."

"Kempff's knowledge of the German language enables him to participate in the consultations which the commandants of the respective forces hold daily and he is able to keep his government advised of what occurs, without the aid of an interpreter. He is fortunate in having with him Captain McCalla, who is one of the most daring and brilliant officers in the navy."

Japan's Naval Increase.
Victoria, B. C., June 15.—From Japan comes news that, in view of the increased augmentation of the Japanese navy, the Japanese government has decided to build a new naval program. As only 1,000,000 yen will be yearly devoted to the navy, then like Admiral Inoue, who is in command of the construction of torpedo boat destroyers. This class of boats cost about 500,000 yen, so that thirty destroyers can be built for the price of one battleship. It is anticipated that the new program will authorize the construction of torpedo boat destroyers.

Excitement Killed Him.
Stockton, Cal., July 15.—Joy at seeing his son after being parted many years ago, killed Cyril Masaretti yesterday in this city. The old man came from Deseret, the first part of the week, to see the remainder of his life with his son. After a happy reunion, the father, who was 81 years old, complained of a heart, which he said was caused by joy and grief combined. He died in a few hours. His wife died in a similar manner on seeing her son, who attended the World's Fair at Chicago.

Photographs of Eclipse Valueless.
Chicago, June 15.—L. H. de la Cruz, a student in Northwestern University, announced that all the photographs he had taken of the eclipse of the sun had been under-exposed and were valueless. His pictures were obtained at the United States naval observatory in Griffin, Mich., where he was assisted by J. C. Watson, instructor of physics in the Northwestern University. The failure to see good photographs is explained by the fact that the line of work which the two men had planned to devote their attention.
