## ANOTHER VETERAN GONE.

Died at his residence in Springville, Utah County, Utah Territory, of Bright's disease of the kidneys, on the 4th of April, A. D. 1878, HENRY MOWER, having been confined to his bed for ten months.

Deceased was born at Frederick, Maryland, U. S., on the 18th day of December, A. D. 1798; moved to Pennsylvania at an early age; embraced the go-pel in the year A. D. 1837; gathered to Nauvoo in 1841; emigrated to Utah in 1851; came to Springville in 1858; presided over the High Priests' Quorum in Springville for many years; died in full faith of the gospel. He has left a wife, ten sons and six daughters, and fifty grandchildren to mourn his loss.

He was interred at Springville, on the 6th of April, A. D. 1878. Twenty-two vehicles followed him to the grave. Having devoted the greatest part of his life in promulgating the principles of the everlasting gospel; he died in peace and full assurance of a glorious resurrection, aged 81 years, 3 months and 16 days.
