

## TWO BURGLARS ARE IN CUSTODY.

They Are Henry Hoffman and Mrs. Henry Schiller, Both of International Reputation.

## ARE CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING

Both Said to be Implicated in a Robbery in London and New York Burglaries.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Two burglars of supposed international reputation are in the custody of government officials in this city, and efforts are to be made by Edward L. Montgomery, stepson of Isaac F. Lloyd, vice president of the Mutual Life insurance company, to have the pair taken to New York. Henry Hoffman, who has a number of aliases, and who was arrested on charges of smuggling diamonds through the port of Boston, is one of the persons under arrest. Mrs. Henry Schiller, who also has numerous other cognomens, is the other prisoner. The specific charge on which the prisoners are held is smuggling. Instead of being merely smugglers, however, it is now alleged that Hoffman and his companion were implicated in a robbery in London and in at least two large burglaries in New York City. According to government officials, both prisoners have confessed to having robbed the home of Mr. Lloyd, where the woman was employed and was apparently a perfect servant. Hundreds of dollars worth of diamonds and silver confiscated by the government when Hoffman and Mrs. Schiller were arrested has been practically identified by Mr. Montgomery as having been taken from the Lloyd home in New York. At the time of the Lloyd burglary articles to the value of \$20,000 are said to have been taken. Another charge which may be placed against the accused is that of robbing the Astor hotel in New York of thousands of dollars worth of jewelry and clothing.

Mrs. Schiller is known as an expert impersonator of men. She has had various other articles of men's attire worn in her rooms. According to the government officials, Mrs. Schiller seems willing to accept all blame, so that Hoffman may be cleared. Hoffman admits that he met the woman near the Lloyd home, and that he had aided her in escaping. About 250 diamonds were found in the possession of the couple when they were arrested.

Previous to the Lloyd robbery, Hoffman and Mrs. Schiller are alleged to have been in London. They are said to have committed a robbery similar to that in the Lloyd home, and Hoffman is said to have confessed that he buried the plunder beneath a tree. Later the woman, disguised as a man, dug up the treasure. She was later joined by Hoffman, and the two fled to the United States. Both prisoners have been held to the federal grand jury by United States Commissioner Foote and are now in jail in default of bail.

## A DUEL TO THE DEATH.

Dog Witness to One Between a Timber Cruiser and Homesteader.

DuPont, Minn., Oct. 4.—With no other witnesses than a vicious dog, two men, James Canty, a timber cruiser, and Gus Lahti, a homesteader, fought a duel to the death Saturday afternoon at Lake Superior. The details of the fight will never be known, but from the appearance of the severe leg wounds sustained by the two men, the ground being torn up over a wide surface. Both men realized that it was a case of the survival of the fittest and both of the bodies were found badly mangled. Canty left Welch's camp near Lake Superior, and it is supposed that he was either attacked by Lahti's dog or had angered Lahti by crossing the line of his homestead.

## PAT CROWE ADMITS HE HAD PISTOL DUEL WITH POLICE

He Says Sixteen Shots Were Fired at Him Before He Repplied in Order To Save His Life.

Butte, Oct. 4.—Pat Crowe today admitted that he was in Omaha six weeks ago and engaged in a pistol duel with the police, during which an officer was shot. He says the police fired 16 shots at him before he replied, and that he opened fire to save his own life. Crowe denies the story from Omaha that he came to Montana to rob a train and meant to go to the Klondike later. He says his sole object in coming out here was to surrender, believing that had better come himself up at a distance from home, so that in yielding to extradition he might make terms favorable to himself with the Nebraska authorities. He denies absolutely his alleged confession, published in Butte last week, that he refused the story that he said that young Cuddey plotted with him to extort money from Mr. Cuddey's son.

Omaha, Oct. 4.—Sheriff Power today received a telegram from Pat Crowe himself, in which Crowe asks the sheriff to go to Montana to bring him to Omaha. In his telegram Crowe says that he will make no effort to avoid extradition in case the sheriff goes after him, but that unless he does so Crowe will make every effort to prevent his being brought to Nebraska. The sheriff has taken no action in the matter and will continue with the Omaha police authorities.

## TREATY OF PEACE HAS ARRIVED IN TOKIO

Tokio, Oct. 4. 8:30 p. m.—M. Yamazaki, director of political affairs of the Japanese foreign office, and H. W. Deming, chief of the American consular office, arrived at Yokohama today on board the steamer Dakota, from Seattle, Sept. 29, bringing the peace treaty signed at Portsmouth Sept. 5 and left immediately for Tokio. They arrived here this evening, but found few people to meet them at the railroad station owing to the strict examination made of all persons by the military and police who guarded the station.

## ATTEMPTED HOLD-UP. Small Boy Fatally Shot and Constable Slightly Wounded.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 4.—George Connel, an 11-year-old boy, was fatally shot, and Constable Sam Klein slightly wounded as a result of an attempt to hold up a constable at Lake Stevens, about 10 miles from Seattle, last night. Gladstone & Green at 301 Fifth avenue shortly after 8 o'clock this evening. George Chickering, alias Thomas Daley, and John Nolan, two of the men implicated in the holdup, are under arrest, and the police are searching for a third man, who was seen by two or three witnesses of the affair but who made his escape during the excitement. Chickering is known to have been implicated in similar affairs in Tacoma.

It is reported that Terry, suspected of robbing the C. & P. R. a year ago, has been missing from Sumas since the night preceding the late robbery. Bill Miner, an ex-convict, sentenced for robbery and known to be a friend of Terry's, is also missing. The Bellingham police are looking for him.

## WHY ENGLAND DELAYS.

Dr. David Jordan Tells All About It

Stanford University, Cal., Oct. 4.—President David Jordan today criticized the student body on things that drew his attention on his recent trip through Europe. In speaking of England he said that in his opinion the decadence of Great Britain, over which many Englishmen are lamenting, is due to two things. One is the emigration to other countries of much of the best brain and brawn of England; the other cause having to do with the death of thousands of England's best men in the numerous wars which that country has waged during the past century.

## IMPROVED SERVICE.

Nat'l Business League Legislative Committee Plans for One.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—The legislative committee of the National Business League met here yesterday. Erskine M. Phelps presiding, and planned to resume its campaign for an improved consular service during the forthcoming congressional session.

The league bill for consular reorganization provides for the substitution of salaries for fees in all grades of the service, grading or classification of consular officials and consular clerks, increased compensation in most of the grades with the merit system of examination.

Familiarity with one or more foreign languages will be required of candidates for admission to the service. Excepting the merit system, which will remove the service entirely from the sphere of political influence, the most important feature of the bill is the provision for a complete Americanization of the service.

## Two Railroads Crash.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 4.—A special train from Midway, B. C., says The Canadian Pacific and Great Northern have come to a crash in this district. Late last Saturday afternoon a Canadian Pacific work train pulled into this place with a large gang of men aboard. The workmen proceeded to a spot on the V. V. & E. in the

neighborhood of Jackson's ranch, about four miles from Midway. There they built a high fence of heavy timbers right across the right of way. Notices were also posted prohibiting trespassing under penalty of prosecution. This morning the graders employed by the V. V. & E. arrived, tore down the fence and proceeded with the work of crossing the lots claimed by the Canadian Pacific.

## STREET RAILWAY EMPLOYEES.

National Convention Now in Session in Chicago

Chicago, Oct. 6.—The national convention of street railway employees in session here yesterday, appropriated \$20,000 for the purchase of 10 automobiles to be used by the union to convey passengers wherever there is a street car strike. The profits from fares to go back into the defense fund, where the \$20,000 came from.

The union owns three automobiles which were used during a strike in Saginaw, Mich. Others were leased during a strike in Bloomington, Ill. W. D. Mahon, president of the national organization, admitted that 10 motor cars would not be of much use in case of a street car strike in Chicago or any large city.

"But they would be a star," at least," he said, "and we would buy or lease more, and an automobile is always good property."

## PLEADED GUILTY.

Federal Judge Pleaded With Counterfeiter to Withdraw Plea.

Houston, Tex., Oct. 6.—Pleaded with from the bench by federal Judge Burns to withdraw his plea of guilty, offered the services of the best attorney at the bar free of cost, while haired William McDermott, 40 years of age, yesterday insisted upon his plea of guilty in the federal court to the charge of counterfeiting, and asked for immediate sentence. He had earned 20 nickels just to see if he could, and told Judge Burns that he had no more money than was needed at home while he was in the penitentiary. He was given 15 months at Leavenworth.

## HOME FOR FOUNDLINGS.

Rockefeller Will Build One, Saying He Opposes Race Suicide.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Cleveland, O., says: A home for foundlings with infant incubators will be erected by John D. Rockefeller in this city for the Cleveland Humane society.

"I am opposed to race suicide," he is reported to have said in announcing his plans to the Humane Society officers yesterday.
