

Shocking Fate of Old Saloon Swamper In Little Hut Near Grant Ave. Sunday Night.

Ogden, April 5 .- Up to an early hour this morning, no arrests had been made in connection with the killing of John

in connection with the killing of John Contos, the Greek candy merchant who was shot down in cold blood by Nick Vegas, Saturday evening. All might Saturday the police and sherift depart-ments used their utmost efforts in try-ing to locate the murderer. All the nearby towns were given a therough description of Vegas. The shooting of Contes, Saturday greening, has aroused the community silmost to a pitch it was when Deputy Sheriff Seymour L. Clark met death at the hands of a cowardly assessin at limit last November. Contos' many years residence in Ogden won for him scores of friends who were incented at the atroclous orime and joined the posses made up of deputy aheriffs and Greeks in searching for the murderer. The motive for the shooting was that Saturday morning Contos got out an Saturday morning Contos got out an attachment and closed Vegas's place of business. Vegas had been running the California fruit stant at the corthe California fruit stant at the cor-ner of Educoin and Twenty-fifth street. Vontos had been furnishing him with fruit and other supplies until the ac-rount amounted to \$259. Vegas was gambling and not paying his bills and Contos decided to close him up. It was about 11:45 o'clock Saturday emplies Contos was in his and

contos decided to close him up. It was about 11:45 o'clock Saturday evening, Contos was in his candy store and bakery, on Twenty-fifth prove between Washington and Grant avenues, when Vegas entered. Ve-pas asked Contos to allow him a little time on making the payment due him. Contos told him he would not do so as he (Vegas) has not paid his bills and had gausbled away his money. Without attering another word Vegas free a large-sized revolver and fired. It then rushed from the store and ran-vest on Twenty fifth street. BURNED TO DEATH IN HUT.

Shocking Fate of Pete Oleine, a Saloon Swamper.
