American Fork, Utah Co., May 4.— American Fork is now without a licensed saloon, a condition that has not existed for many years. It will be remembered that just previous to the municipal election last fall the Democratic party here piedged them-selves to the closing of the saloons at nine o'clock. A majority of the council elected were Democrats, and after election the proposed change from 11 to 9 o'clock p. m. as the time for closing was made and the license reduced from \$800 to \$600 per year. The licenses of the salessy keepers assured on Andi of the saloon keepers expired on April 30th, and they concluded not to renew under the new regulations, claiming that it would be a losing proposition.
