CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met in regular session last night, President Loofbourow in the chair. The councilmen present were Rich, Folland, Hardy, Karlick, Moran, Kelly, Evans, Wantland, Lawson, Beardsley, Helsa, Simondi, Horn, Bell—14.

Absent—None.

THE PROCEEDINGS.

Dr. E. G. Boyle sent in a claim for \$74 damages alleged to have been sustained by a horse owned by him by stepping in a hole on Ninth East street. Committee on claims.

Mrs. M. Mansfield, agent, sent in a communication stating that the Pacific Paving company laid a sidewalk on property belonging to J. S. Farlyce on Fifth East street in 1891, and that the board of public works has not yet accepted the same. She therefore desired the sidewalk accepted and the taxes canceled, as the city collector had threatened to bring suit for the same. Filed.

Browning Brothers asked to be relieved from paying certain city taxes. Received and filed.

J. D. Ford asked that he be given a rebate in city taxes on land owned by him and illegally levied upon. City attorney.

THE MAYOR TALKS BACK.

Mayor Baskin sent in a communication in which he stated:

In regard to the purchase of water pipe which at your last meeting you directed the committee on waterworks to make of Rhodes Bros., I beg leave to state that today I received a dispatch from the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, offering to deliver the pipe in question at Salt Lake City for \$34.50 per ton. This is fifty cents below that of Rhode Bros. As a large proportion of the pipe used by the city has been furnished by this company I do not understand why a bid was not solicited from it by the company in the present case. The acceptance of this bid would save to the city over \$100 and I beg leave to remind the Honorable President and Council that in the former case in which this same committee was authorized to make the purchase in the same irregular manner as has been followed in the present case, I was able to save the city \$450.

Moran—I will say that the committee did solicit bids from the company referred to in his honor's communication. The mayor is mistaken in what he says. Of course he could get bids fifty cents per ton cheaper than the price given to the company. Why? Because his company had heard of the bids as opened by the committee. Business is business the world over and our Mayor should understand that as well as anybody.

The matter was referred to the committee on waterworks.

WATERMAIN EXTENSION.

The committee on waterworks reported favorably on the petition of the board of education asking for watermain extension on Second South street from midway between Sixth and Seventh West streets to Seventh West street.

MINORITY REPORT.

Moran offered the following as a minority report: In the matter of the petition of the board of education asking for extension of watermain from midway between Sixth and Seventh West streets on Second South street to Seventh West street to the site of the Franklin school house, I recommend that the same be granted. In making this recommendation I as a member of the committee on waterworks wish to state that while it may be unusual, yet owing to the fact that property owners in the locality named have not asked for the extension, and it being for the public school service, and being a necessity, as they will not be able to open the school until the water connections are made, I deem it advisable that the extension be made without delay, at the expense of the city. Of course, if at any time the property owners should wish to take the water from this main they would have to pay their proportion of the cost before making their connection.

A good deal of discussion followed the reading of the last report which was defeated and a motion to adopt the majority report prevailed.

HE IS NOW A POLICEMAN.

The committee on police reported favorably on the petition of J. H. Young for the appointment of Robert Bult as a special policeman.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

The committee on improvements recommended that electric lights be placed at the corner of Seventh South

and Fourth West streets, also at corner of L and Fifth streets. Adopted.

AFFECTED COMPROMISE.

On recommendation of the committee on claims Mrs. G. W. Snell's compromise for a claim of \$299 for damages sustained by falling on the sidewalk was rejected.

GROESBECK SIDEWALK.

The following from the committee on streets was adopted: We beg leave to recommend in the matter of the communication from the board of public works reporting in favor of granting permission to J. A. Groesbeck to construct his own sidewalk on Main street, that the report of the board of public works be approved, the walk to be constructed as soon as the weather permit, not to be later than May 1st, 1893, and to be laid to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

JOHN'S PETITION DENIED.

The committee on streets reported adversely on the petition of John Williams to run a refreshment stand at No. 43 First South street. Adopted.

NEW LIGHT ON THE FIRE STATION QUESTION.

The committee on fire department reported as follows in the matter of fire stations: That we have received bids which we submit herewith. We find that the stations cannot be built for the amount allowed not by nearly 50 per cent, and find that by making the reductions as per attached list, the buildings can be erected for the specified amount, viz.: \$11,000, and will be fully adequate for all purposes for a considerable time to come. We therefore recommend that all bids be returned and that new bids be advertised for on the revised plans.

VIN KROLOW'S COMMUNICATION.

In connection with the report the following was read from Architect Vin Krolow:

I beg to propose to you some alterations on the plans and specifications on three fire houses so as to enable me to get in satisfactory bids for you to consider and accept. I propose to reduce the two fire houses, the Fair Ground and South West from 72 to 52. I will also exchange the joist on the first floor from 3x16 to 3x12, also the pressed brick sills on the fair ground building to be constituted of good, hard, common brick of equal color and to match the front elevation. I also propose to deduct three w. o's, wash basins and three urinals. These omissions will enable me to bring the building down to what you first instructed. I trust this will meet with your approval, and on acceptance of same will furnish you either with a certified check of \$1000 or with bondsmen to equal amount.

After a thirty minutes' debate the whole matter was referred back to the committee with instructions to submit new plans.

THE HORSE FEED QUIBBLE.

The matter of allowing some of the heads of departments \$200 per year for horse feed was referred back to the committee making such recommendation.

CITY PAY ROLLS.

The committee on finance reported in the matter of the manner in which the pay rolls of the Jordan Canal and
