A distinguished visitor will arrive
in this city, early in the coming week,
in the person of Archbishop Redwood
of Wellington, New Zealand, who is
en route to Rome for an audience with

the pope. He is expected to remain
in this city a week or 10 days as the
guest of the Marist Fathers at All Hallows
college of whose order he is a
member.

The archbishop was a classmate of
Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul and
Bishop O'Gorman of Sioux City, Ia.,
at the Marist college near Lyons,
France. He is accompanied on his trip
by his secretary, Very Rev. Dean
Smith, who will also be a guest at All
Hallows college. There will be a re-
ception to the archbishop at a date
to be announced later, and his stay here
will be made as comfortable as possible.
He is a noted musician as well
as prelate, and is the possessor of a
genuine Stradivarius violin which it is
expected he will play for the entertain-
ment of his hosts while here.

Archbishop Redwood has been in the
United States before. He participated
in the deliberations of the Parliament
of Religions held at Chicago during the
great fair where he made an address,
and he is regarded as a man of progress
and a democratic churchman.

City Council and Other Experts to
Scrutinize Alpine Creek.

Mayor Morris, City Engineer Snow,

experts, will visit the site of the pro-
posed lighting plant for Salt Lake City
in American Fork canyon next Wednes-
day. The party will leave on the 8
o'clock Rio Grande Western train and
go to American Fork at which point it
will take carriages and drive to the
head of American Fork canyon and
Alpine creek.

by electrical power experts of the city
as to their being sufficient water power
in the proposed location to answer the

oughly investigated by the experts

on Wednesday.

several weeks nothing was done in the
matter and Stansbury sold his saloon
and left the state. The matter was
finally reported to Sheriff Emery who
took immediate steps toward locating
Stansbury. His efforts were success-
ful in that respect and he found the
man at Chillicothe, Mo., where he had
been arrested. After the long trip of the
sheriff and assistant county attorney
after the man, the object of their mis-
sion was defeated by the prisoner be-
ing released under a writ of habeas
corpus.
